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PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Security Requirement

2. Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted only to Public Works and Government Services Canada (PWGSC) Bid Receiving Unit by the date, time and place indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation.

2.1 Improvement of Requirement During Solicitation Period

Should bidders consider that the specifications or Statement of Work contained in the bid solicitation could be improved technically or technologically, bidders are invited to make suggestions, in writing, to the Contracting Authority named in the bid solicitation. Bidders must clearly outline the suggested improvement as well as the reason for the suggestion. Suggestions that do not restrict the level of competition nor favour a particular bidder will be

given consideration provided they are submitted to the Contracting Authority at least five (5) days before the bid closing date. Canada will have the right to accept or reject any or all suggestions.

3. Enquiries - Bid Solicitation

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than seven (7) calendar days before the bid closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the questions or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question is eliminated, and the enquiry can be answered with copies to all bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all bidders may not be answered by Canada.

4. Applicable Laws

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in British Columbia.

2. Basis of Selection

A bid must comply with the requirements of the bid solicitation and meet all mandatory technical evaluation criteria to be declared responsive. The responsive bid with the lowest evaluated price on an aggregate basis will be recommended for award of a contract.

PART 5 - CERTIFICATIONS

Bidders must provide the required certifications to be awarded a contract. Canada will declare a bid non-responsive if the required certifications are not completed and submitted as requested.

Annex A Requirement

1.0 Scope

- 1.1 This purchase description applies to the supply and deliver of-two hundred two (202) upholstered wood chairs.

2.0 General Requirements

- 2.1 The finished chairs must be uniform in quality, clean and free from any defects that may affect their appearance and serviceability.
- 2.2 External surfaces must be smooth and all edges must be rounded and beveled. All accessible surfaces must be free from sharp edges, burns and other hazards to safety. All exposed wood must be clear cutting and free of knots and splits.
- 2.3 The contractor must mark all chairs permanently and legibly on the underside of the seat with the name of the recognized trademark of the manufacturer, the product number, the contract number, and the date of manufacture.
- 2.4 All components must have the same finish and design details.
- 2.5 All furniture or component parts must be exposed at least 24 hours prior to packaging and distribution to allow for any off gassing.

3.0 Standards

- 3.1 Meet applicable ANSI/BIFMA Standards for safety and performance.
- 3.2 Fabrics to meet abrasion standards fro Heavy Duty Contract : minimum 50,000 double rubs Wyzenbeek Abrasion Test ASTM D 4147-02
- 3.3 Conforms to ANSI/BIFMA e#-2011e Furniture Sustainability Standard
- 3.4 Conforms to ; GGPS.001 Greenguard IAQ Standard for Building, Materials, and Furnishing Units

4.0 Detailed Requirements

5.0 Design

5.1 Backs- Upholstered cushion back. Front and back to be fully upholstered

5.2 Seats- Seat must be upholstered with cushion and the stitching on the seat must have a waterfall edge, not visible.

5.3 Arms- polished stainless steel or similar.

5.4 Legs - Legs must be made up of four (4) square tapered legs complete with metal glides.

5.5 Style - Similar to Figure 'A' with arms + Figure 'B' armless

6.0 Finish

6.1 Wood finish may be chosen from Manufacturer's standard offerings or other custom product to include an option for a walnut brown mid tone stain color.

6.2 All wood finishes to be uniform and matching in color and finish.

6.3 Finish must be durable and suitable for a commercial environment.

7.0 Upholstery

- 8.2 Dowels, tenons, chucking and boring with adequate glue applied will be used when applicable, with appropriate mechanical reinforcements used when necessary and practical. Reinforcing cleats and and/or corner blocks, glued and screwed will be used when necessary for secure fastening.
