SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS (SI)

SI01 INTRODUCTION

1. Public Works and Government Services Canada (PWGSC) intends to retain a Contractor to provide construction services for the project as set out in this Request for Proposal (RFP).
2. Bidders responding to this RFP are requested to submit a full and complete quotation (refer to SI06 'Submission of Bid'). The bid will cover not only the qualifications, experience and organization of the Bidder (Envelope 1 - Qualifications), but also the pricing and terms offered (Envelope 2 - Price).

SI02 CODE OF CONDUCT AND CERTIFICATIONS - RELATED DOCUMENTATION

By submitting a bid, the Bidder certifies that the Bidder and its affiliates are in compliance with the provisions as stated in Section 01 Code of Conduct and Certifications - Bid of Standard Instructions R2710T (2013-06-27). The related documentation therein required will assist Canada in confirming that the certifications are true.

SI04 ENQUIRIES DURING THE SOLICITATION PERIOD

1. Enquiries regarding this bid must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Officer named on the Request for Proposal - Page 1 as early as possible within the solicitation period. Except for the approval of alternative materials as described in GI15 of R2710T, enquiries should be received no later than five (5) calendar days prior to the date set for solicitation closing to allow sufficient time to provide a response. Enquiries received after that time may not result in an answer being provided.
2. To ensure consistency and quality of the information provided to Bidders, the Contracting Officer shall examine the content of the enquiry and shall decide whether or not to issue an amendment.
3. All enquiries and other communications related to this bid sent throughout the solicitation period are to be directed ONLY to the Contracting Officer named on the Invitation to Tender - Page 1. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the bid being declared non-responsive.

SI05 BIDDERS' CONFERENCE (A9083T 2006-06-16)

A bidders' conference will be held at the Discovery Lodge Hotel, 1056 Mivvik Street on 13 February 2014. The conference will begin at 09:00 A.M. local time, in Iqaluit, Nunavut. The scope of the requirement outlined in the bid solicitation will be reviewed during the conference and questions will be answered. It is recommended that bidders who intend to submit a bid attend or send a representative.

Bidders are requested to communicate with the Contracting Authority before the conference to confirm attendance. Bidders should provide, in writing, to the Contracting Authority, the names of the person(s) who will be attending and a list of issues they wish to table at least 3 working days before the scheduled conference.

Any clarifications or changes to the bid solicitation resulting from the bidders' conference will be included as an amendment to the bid solicitation. Bidders who do not attend will not be precluded from submitting a bid.

The bid must be received on or before the date and time set for solicitation closing. Prior to submitting the bid, the Bidder shall ensure that the following information is clearly printed or typed on the face of the bid envelope:

SI10 OPENING OF BIDS

Due to the nature of this solicitation , there will be no public bid opening.

SI11 EVALUATION

1. Envelope 1 - Technical, Management & Organizational Qualifications - will be opened in private : this envelope will be opened first to evaluate the submittal requirements. Requirements will be evaluated on a Pass or Fail basis. Failure to meet any or all of the mandatory requirement(s) will render the bid non-compliant and no other consideration will be given to the bid.
2. Each rated evaluation criterion has a point allotment that reflects its importance in bid submissions. The degree to which the bid satisfies the requirement of each criterion will be assessed and a score will be assigned ranging from 0 to the total point allotment, with 0 meaning the bid completely fails to satisfy the requirements, and the total allotment meaning the bid fully meets the outlined criterion.
3. Section 4.1 of the Technical Portion has a mandatory minimum pass mark of 50%. Each bid must achieve a minimum of 60% overall score for the Technical portion, and a minimum of 60% overall score for the Management and Organizational portion. Bids that fail to achieve the minimum score in either portion will be considered technically unacceptable and will be given no further consideration.
4. The contractor will be selected on the basis of the Assessed Best Value with the highest combined rating of Merit - 60% (Technical, Management and Organizational and Aboriginal Opportunities Consideration) and Cost - 40% (Price)
5. Additional points will be assessed for the Aboriginal Opportunities Consideration (AOC) portion with no minimum pass mark. However, it does add additional points to the maximum total points available overall.
6. Envelope 2 - Price: Only those envelopes from Bidder's that meet the mandatory requirements of the Technical, Management & Organizational Qualifications shall be opened. Envelope 2 submittals will be evaluated against the mandatory requirements, failure to comply with any or all of the mandatory requirement(s) will render the bid non-compliant and no other consideration will be given to the bid.

SI12 SELECTION METHOD - COMBINED MERIT 60%/COST 40%

1. The contractor will be selected on the basis of the Assessed Best Value with the highest combined rating of Merit - 60% (Technical, Management and Organizational and Aboriginal Opportunities Consideration) and Cost - 40% (Price).
2. The scoring for price will be done by allocating full marks to the lowest price bid, with the other bids being given a prorated score. Based on the results of the evaluations, the bidder with the highest combined total points, given that the price of the bid does not exceed the maximum premium of 15% of the lowest priced compliant bid, will be recommended for award of the contract. If the bidder with the highest combined total points exceeds the maximum premium of 15% of the lowest priced compliant bid, their bid will be considered non compliant and given no further consideration.

SI13 COMPLETION OF SUBMISSION
