PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Security Requirement

There is no security requirement associated with the requirement.

2. Requirement

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) has a requirement for a firm quantity of four hundred fifty (450) pairs of Blue Overalls.

Additionally, there is an "as and when requested" quantity of up to ten (10) made-to-measure pairs of Blue Overalls (specials), which can be ordered within 36 months of contract award.

There is also an "as and when requested" quantity of up to one hundred (100) regular sized pairs of Blue Overalls (flexible stock), which can be ordered within 36 months of contract award.

This requirement includes an optional quantity of up to two hundred (200) pairs of Blue Overalls, which can be ordered within 36 months of contract award.

The requirement is to be supplied in accordance with RCMP Specification G.S. 1045-074 dated 2014-01-10 and viewing sample.

This requirement is conditionally limited to Canadian goods.

2.1 Optional Quantities

The Contractor grants to Canada the irrevocable option to acquire Blue Overalls under the same terms and conditions and at the price(s) in the resulting contract. The optional quantity may only be exercised for up to a maximum of two hundred (200) units. The optional quantity may only be exercised by the Contracting Authority and will be evidenced, for administrative purposes only, through a contract amendment.

The Contracting Authority may exercise the optional quantity within 36 months after contract award date, by sending a written notice to the contractor.

3. Debriefings

After contract award, bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days of receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.

4. Procurement Ombudsman

1. Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the bid solicitation by number, date and title are set out in the *Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions Manual* (<https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual>) issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

Revision to Departmental Name: As this solicitation is issued by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), any reference to Public Works and Government Services Canada or PWGSC or its Minister contained in any term, condition or clause of this solicitation, including any individual SACC clauses incorporated by reference, will be interpreted as reference to RCMP or its Minister.

Bidders who submit a bid agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the bid solicitation and accept the clauses and conditions of the resulting contract.

The 2003 (2013-06-01) Standard Instructions - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, are incorporated by reference into and form part of the bid solicitation.

2. Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted only to Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) Bid Receiving Unit by the date, time and place indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation.

Due to the nature of the bid solicitation, bids transmitted by facsimile or by email to the RCMP will not be accepted.

PLEASE NOTE:

Bidders may submit more than one (1) bid per solicitation; however multiple bids must be submitted in separate bid packages.

3. Enquiries - Bid Solicitation



All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than **seven (7) calendar days before the bid closing date**. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the questions or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question is eliminated, and the enquiry can be answered with copies to all bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all bidders may not be answered by Canada.

4. Applicable Laws

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in the province of Ontario.

Bidders may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the bidders.

Test Reports for the following property are required as defined herein:

1. The Lining Material – paragraph 4.1.3 and Table I of the specification requires test reports if an alternate to the Doubletex Calypso or Bountysset US is used.

The pre-contract award sample will be evaluated for quality of workmanship and conformance to specified materials and measurements. Minor observations will not be a reason to reject the sample unless, in the opinion of the technical evaluator, they are considered to render the item unserviceable. However, only one deviation will result in the bid being declared non-responsive.

The requirement for a pre-contract award sample and certificates of compliance/test reports will not relieve the successful bidder from submitting a sample and/or Certificates of Compliance/test reports as required by the contract terms or from strictly adhering to the technical requirement of this Request for Proposal and any resultant contract.

Submitted a pre-contract award sample of the item(s) on a previous requirement or through a separate pre-qualification process by the RCMP Technical Authority to the latest specification and where the pre-contract award sample was found to be compliant. Bidders may be requested to submit a copy of the evaluation report to validate compliance.

If the above has been met, the bidder must sign this representation and warrants that no significant changes have occurred in their manufacturing processes or their organization since the last award or pre-contract award qualification, which could affect the manufacturing of the referenced item.

Certificate of Compliance - Definition

A certificate of compliance is defined for this solicitation as a signed and dated certification by an appropriate official of the component manufacturer. (e.g. slide fastener, hook and loop, webbing, etc.) It must specifically address the adherence of the offered component to the specification or manufacturing data of the technical requirement.

A separate certificate of compliance is required for each individual product or component. It must be dated within eighteen (18) months of the solicitation posting date; and must certify that the product for which the Certificate of Compliance was issued is the same product used in the bid submission, or in the pre-award sample or in the pre-production sample, or in the production units as applicable.

The Bidder is to note that copies of invoices, purchase orders and Certificates of Compliance for products or components that are not manufactured by the certifier are not suitable for use as a Certificate.

1.2 Financial Evaluation

2. Basis of Selection

A bid must comply with the requirements of the bid solicitation and meet all mandatory technical criteria and financial evaluation to be declared responsive.

The responsive bid with the lowest evaluated price will be recommended for award of a contract (1 contract only).

Evaluation of price will be established using the firm, made-to-measure, flexible stock and optional quantities.

PART 5 - CERTIFICATIONS

Bidders must provide the required certifications and documentation to be awarded a contract.

The certifications provided by bidders to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Canada will declare a bid non-responsive, or will declare a contractor in default, if any certification made by the Bidder is found to be untrue whether during the bid evaluation period or during the contract period.

The Contracting Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Bidder's certifications. Failure to comply with this request will also render the bid non-responsive or will constitute a default under the Contract.

4.2 Shipping Instructions – Delivery at Destination

Goods must be consigned to the destination specified in the Contract and delivered:

Delivered Duty Paid (DDP) Ottawa, Ontario Incoterms 2000 for shipments from a commercial contractor.

4.3 Packaging, Marking, Rejected Goods, Overruns and Underruns

Packaging

To be in accordance with standard commercial packaging so as to ensure safe arrival of goods at destination; Thirty (30) units to be placed in a shipping container 23”L X 17”W X 10”D.

Marking

RCMP Stock Item Numbers are a requirement solely of the purchaser and should not interfere with the manufacturer's normal sizing or marking procedures. Inability to provide the detail as stated below must be indicated hereafter:

- a. Size and RCMP Stock Item Number to be indicated on merchandise, if item consists of more than one piece (pair, set) each piece to be marked.
- b. Size, quantity and RCMP Stock Item Number to be indicated on single unit package, when specified.
- c. Sizes, quantities and RCMP Stock Item Numbers to be indicated on carton.
- d. Proper shipping documents must accompany each shipment. Packing slips must include the contract number, item description, size, RCMP stock item number and quantity per size being shipped.
