Part 1. Interpretation

- 1.1 Elections Canada hereby amends in accordance with this amendment the Request for Proposal for Public Opinion Survey of Electors for the 42nd Federal General Election bearing number ECBR-RFP-14-0540 and dated October 16, 2014 (the "RFP"). This amendment hereby forms part of the RFP.
- 1.2 Unless defined herein or unless the context otherwise requires, all of the words and phrases defined in the RFP and used in this amendment shall have the same meanings assigned to them in the RFP.

Part 2. Questions and Answers

The following question(s) have been asked in response to the Request for Proposal and Elections Canada hereby answers as follows:

2.1 Question No. 3

<u>Question</u>: To identify persons with disabilities, what definition of disability should we use? Is it the following? Disability is conceptualised as the interaction between barriers and impairments. Impairments may be physical, cognitive, mental, sensory, emotional, developmental, or some combination of these. Barriers may be physical, like stairs or attitudinal, like bias and may differ depending on context.

<u>Answer</u>: Although previous surveys of Elections Canada voters contained this variable among sociodemographic data, no precise definition of persons with disabilities has been used before.

To obtain a representative sample of Canadians with disabilities using the proposed strategy, the definition, which can be used to ask respondents whether they have a disability, can be part of the elements of the proposal. This will be evaluated according to the evaluation criteria.

2.2 Question No. 4

<u>Question</u>: Since the survey has been conducted in the past, can we have a copy of the questionnaire? Specifically the questions used to target certain groups (young electors, immigrants, persons with disabilities and Aboriginal electors)?

<u>Answer</u>: Previous surveys of electors following general elections have included an oversampling of Aboriginal electors (since 2004), young electors (since 2006) and immigrants (since 2008).

This is the first year that Elections Canada requires a quota of persons with disabilities in a survey of electors.

For reference, please find attached the questionnaires for the survey of electors for the general elections in 2008 and 2011.

2.3 Question No. 5

<u>Question</u>: Do you have statistics on the incidence rate of households with a presence of each of the four targeted categories?

Answer: No, Elections Canada does not have this information.

2.4 Question No. 6

<u>Question</u>: Will the questionnaire be provided in both languages or will we need to translate it into French?

<u>Answer</u>: The questionnaire will be provided by Elections Canada in both Official Languages.

2.5 Question No. 7

<u>Question</u>: Do we need to produce the report first in English and then translate it in French? Must we do the same for other deliverables?

Do we need to translate all answers to open-ended questions? If so, how many open ended questions will there be?

<u>Answer</u>: All deliverables including the report may be first submitted in either Official Language, at the Contractor's discretion, and subsequently translated to the other Official Language by the Contractor.

We expect to ask approximately five open-ended questions; however, it is not required to translate the answers to open-ended questions.
