BACKGROUND:

INTRODUCTION

The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC), Centre for Foodborne Environmental Zoonotic Infectious Disease (CFEZID), Food-borne Disease and AMR Surveillance Division (FDASD) has a requirement for the provision of Grower-Finisher swine faecal samples and/or questionnaire data for the surveillance of antimicrobial resistance and antimicrobial use.

OBJECTIVES

This project will provide data on antimicrobial use and the occurrence of antimicrobial resistance in grower/finisher swine. The results of the analyses will provide information on the epidemiology of antimicrobial resistance in swine production and inform the framework development process regarding the logistics of sample collection and submission from sentinel herds distributed across the five major pork producing provinces.

SCOPE:

The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) has a requirement to maintain and sustain a national farm antimicrobial drug use and resistance surveillance program across the five major pork producing provinces (Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec) under the Canadian Integrated Program for Antimicrobial Resistance Surveillance (CIPARS) and a sentinel-site based farm food and water-borne pathogen surveillance program under FoodNet Canada. This project will provide data on antimicrobial use and the occurrence of antimicrobial resistance in microbes isolated from grower-finisher swine. The results of the analyses will provide information on the epidemiology of food and water-borne disease, antimicrobial resistance and antimicrobial use in swine production.

This work is one component of an effort to develop a national strategy for antimicrobial resistance and use in Canadian agriculture, a strategy which includes surveillance, research, risk assessment and the development and promotion of antimicrobial prudent use guidelines.

Each bidder will commit to a specified number of sentinel farms, which will be identified in the bidder's response template, and the total provided above will be multiplied by the number of sentinel farms per bidder for the total contract amount.

When PHAC is prepared to exercise the option year, the set fees will be reassessed and updated. Contractors will be provided with the fees 90 days prior to renewal and asked to review and accept. **NOTE: In the option years, the requirement may be for one or both of the deliverables (sample collection and/or questionnaire completion.

The Agency's budget dictates the total number of farms that can be sampled in a given year. Contracts will be awarded on a "first come" basis, up to the maximum annual budget.

OWNERSHIP OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY:

SECURITY REQUIREMENT:

MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS:

M1. The bidder must be a veterinarian licensed to practice in the province(s) where swine sentinel farm surveillance is being conducted. Provinces included are Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Québec. At the time of bid closing bidders must provide a valid provincial veterinary license number from the province they wish to sample in.

M2. The bidder must be able to provide their own transportation to the sentinel sites

SELECTION METHODOLOGY:

Bids must comply with the requirements of the bid solicitation and meet all mandatory technical evaluation criteria to be declared responsive. All responsive bids will be recommended for award of a contract on a "first come" basis, up to the maximum annual budget.

PART 1 – INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

1.1 Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

Canada may exercise this option at any time by sending a written notice to the Contractor before the end date of the Contract. The option may only be exercised by the Contracting Authority and will be evidenced for administrative purposes only, through an amendment to the Contract.

2.6. Payment

2.6.1 Basis of Payment

In consideration of the Contractor satisfactorily completing all of its obligations under the Contract, the Contractor will be paid a firm unit price as specified in Annex B for a cost of \$ 700.00/herd. Customs duties are included and Applicable Taxes are extra.

Canada will not pay the Contractor for any design changes, modifications or interpretations of the Work, unless they have been approved, in writing, by the Contracting Authority before their incorporation into the Work.

2.6.2 Method of Payment -MILESTONE PAYMENTS

Canada will make milestone payments in accordance with the Schedule of Milestones detailed in Annex B and the payment provisions of the Contract if:

- i. an accurate and complete claim for payment, and any other document required by the Contract have been submitted in accordance with the invoicing instructions provided in the Contract;
- ii. all work associated with the milestone and as applicable any deliverable required has been completed and accepted by Canada.

ANNEX A – STATEMENT OF WORK

Canadian Integrated Program for Antimicrobial Resistance Surveillance (CIPARS) Farm Swine Veterinarian Services.

1. SCOPE

1.1. Introduction

1.2. Objectives of the Requirement

This project will provide data on antimicrobial use and the occurrence of antimicrobial resistance in grower/finisher swine. The results of the analyses will provide information on the epidemiology of antimicrobial resistance in swine production and inform the framework development process regarding the logistics of sample collection and submission from sentinel herds distributed across the five major pork producing provinces.

1.3. Background and Specific Scope of the Requirement

The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) has a requirement to maintain and sustain a national farm antimicrobial drug use and resistance surveillance program across the five major pork producing provinces (Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec) under the Canadian Integrated Program for Antimicrobial Resistance Surveillance (CIPARS) and a sentinel-site based farm food and water-borne pathogen surveillance program under FoodNet Canada. 2. **REQUIREMENTS**

2.1. Tasks, Activities, Deliverables and Milestones

In consultation with representatives of the Centre for Food-Borne, Environmental and Zoonotic Infectious Diseases (CFEZID), Surveillance Division and other project collaborators, the Contractor shall:

1. Enrol or confirm the on-going participation of Sentinel Sites in the farm antimicrobial use and resistance surveillance program that meet the following criteria. Herds already enrolled by a participating veterinarian cannot be enrolled in this surveillance program again by another veterinarian.

Include herds that:

• reside within the 5 major pork producing provinces (Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, and Quebec);

• are Canadian Quality Assurance (CQA[®]) validated; and

• produce more than 2000 Close-to-Market hogs per year and are representative of the demographic (e.g. corporate, independent, co-operative/loops, production volume) and geographic distribution of herds in the contractor's swine practice.

Exclude herds that:

• are regarded to be organic pertaining to animal husbandry; or

- that feed Edible Residual Materials (ERM); or
- are pasture-raised.
- 2. The Contractor shall schedule close-to-market sampling and/or questionnaire completion dates at each site as designated in the yearly Farm Swine Surveillance Program description.
- 3. Review the provided Informed Consent Form, with the producer when enrolling a new sentinel grower/finisher swine herd. The last page of the consent form should be completed, signed and dated by the producer and the contractor. Signed copies of this document are to be retained by the producer and contractor. Signed copies of this document should NOT be sent to the Public Health Agency of Canada to protect the identity, privacy and confidentiality of participating producers.
- 4. Conduct each sampling and/or questionnaire visit scheduled in No 2 and submit the associated samples and/or questionnaire, as outlined in the specific Herd Sampling Visit Checklists.
- 5. Disburse funds, or the equivalent in professional services, to participating producers as outlined in the Farm Swine Surveillance Program description. These funds are included in the total amount paid to the Contractor.

Deliverables

- 1. For each enrolled sentinel site, six (6) composite fecal samples will be collected and submitted as designated in the Farm Swine Surveillance Program description
- 2. For each enrolled sentinel site a CIPARS Farm Swine Surveillance Program questionnaire will be completed and submitted as designated in the Farm Swine Surveillance Program description

Milestones

For each bidder a predetermined number of samples and questionnaires are required by December 15, 2017, and a predetermined number of samples and questionnaires are required by March 27, 2018. Payment will be provided on a per herd basis when the samples and/or questionnaires are received and/or validated by the CIPARS Farm Swine Surveillance Program.

2.2. Specifications and Standards

2.3. Technical, Operational and Organizational Environment

The work conducted as part of this contract is part of a suite of activities related to the development of farm antimicrobial resistance and antimicrobial use monitoring under the Canadian Integrated Program for Antimicrobial Resistance Surveillance.

2.4. Method and Source of Acceptance

The requirement of this contract will be considered acceptable when the deliverables outlined in section 2.1 are completed and accepted as satisfactory by the Project Authority.

The survey deliverables and invoicing shall be supplied in electronic or hard copy to the Program Operations Assistant.

2.5. Reporting Requirements

The Contractor shall submit one (1) questionnaire per year for each herd as designated in the yearly Farm Swine Surveillance Program description

2.6. Project Management Control Procedures

The Farm Swine Program Operations Assistant will monitor and track sample / questionnaire submission for all herds enrolled in the program

3. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

3.1. Canada's Obligations

- PHAC will provide the Contractor with all sampling supplies for collection of samples and questionnaire forms.
- PHAC will provide prepaid mail envelopes and courier waybills for shipping of samples and questionnaires.
- PHAC will assign the Contractor a Veterinarian ID number along with Herd ID numbers for the number of herds enrolled for confidentiality purposes.

3.2. Contractor's Obligations

• Unless otherwise specified, the Contractor must use their own equipment for the performance of this Statement of Work.

3.3. Location of Work, Work site and Delivery Point

This work will be completed within 5 major pork producing provinces (Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec).

3.4. Language of Work

All work and deliverables will be conducted in English and/or French.

3.5. Insurance Requirements

It shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to decide whether or not any insurance coverage is necessary for its own protection or to fulfill its obligations under the contract or to ensure compliance with required federal, provincial or municipal law. Any such insurance shall be provided and maintained by the Contractor at their expense.

3.6. Travel and Living

There are no travel and living expenses associated with this contract.

ANNEX B – BASIS OF PAYMENT

- **1.1.** Canada will pay the Contractor for the satisfactory performance of the agreed to services an allinclusive firm unit price of \$700.00/herd, inclusive of all expenses, customs and duties. Applicable taxes are extra.
- **1.2.** All prices and amounts of money in the Contract are exclusive of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) or Harmonized Sales Tax (HST), whichever is applicable, unless otherwise indicated. GST or HST, to the extent applicable, will be incorporated into all invoices and progress claims for goods supplied or work performed and will be paid by Canada. The Contractor agrees to remit to Canada Revenue Agency any GST or HST paid or due.
- **1.3.** No increase in the total liability of Canada or in the price of Work resulting from any design changes, modifications or interpretations of specifications made by the Contractor will be authorized or paid to the Contractor unless such changes, modifications or interpretations have been approved in writing by the Contracting Authority prior to their incorporation into the Work. The Contractor is not obliged to perform any Work or provide any service that would cause the total liability of Canada to be exceeded without the prior written approval of the Contracting Authority. The Contractor will notify the Project Authority in writing as to the adequacy of this sum:
 - a. when it is seventy five percent (75%) committed, or
 - b. four (4) months prior to the Contract expiry date, or
 - c. if the Contractor considers the funds provided to be inadequate for the completion of the Work, whichever comes first.

In the event that the notification refers to inadequate funds, the Contractor will provide to the Project Authority, in writing, an estimate for the additional funds required. Provision of such notification and estimate for the additional fund does not increase the liability of Canada.
