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


This Model Bid Solicitation contains samples of the terms that will form the basis for any future requests for proposals (RFPs) for Natural Resources Canada (NRCan).

To the extent possible, these Articles are written as they will appear in any future RFP(s). However, individual RFPs and the Resulting Contract Clauses may be modified to suit individual requirements. For example, the nature of the requirement, the term of the resulting Contract, the evaluation methodology and the basis of payment clauses may all be tailored to individual requirements.

The Articles in the Resulting Contract Clauses are mandatory in their entirety, unless otherwise indicated. Acceptance of these Articles, in their entirety, as they appear in this Annex, is a Mandatory requirement of this RFP. Suppliers submitting an Offer containing statements implying that their Offer is conditional on modification of these clauses or containing terms and conditions that purport to supersede these clauses or derogate from them will be considered non-responsive.

Offerors with concerns regarding the provisions of the Model Bid Solicitation (including the Resulting Contract Clauses) should raise such concerns in accordance with the Enquiries provision of this RFP.



PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Introduction

The bid solicitation is divided into seven parts plus attachments and annexes, as follows:

- Part 1 General Information: provides a general description of the requirement;
- Part 2 Bidder Instructions: provides the instructions, clauses and conditions applicable to the bid solicitation;
- Part 3 Bid Preparation Instructions: provides bidders with instructions on how to prepare their bid;
- Part 4 Evaluation Procedures and Basis of Selection: indicates how the evaluation will be conducted, the evaluation criteria that must be addressed in the bid, and the basis of selection;
- Part 5 Certifications: includes the certifications to be provided;
- Part 6 Security Requirements: includes specific requirements that must be addressed by bidders; and
- Part 7 Resulting Contract Clauses: includes the clauses and conditions that will apply to any resulting contract.

The Annexes include the Statement of Work, the Basis of Payment and the Insurance Requirements.

The Appendixes include the Evaluation Criteria and the Financial Proposal Form.

1.2 Summary


By means of the RFP, NRCan is seeking a contractor to produce graphics on media that can withstand harsh winter conditions on to four (4) satellite dishes located at the Inuvik Satellite Facility.

The period of the contract shall be from Contract award to June 29, 2018.

1.3 Debriefings

Bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days from receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.



PART 2 - BIDDER INSTRUCTIONS

2.1 Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the bid solicitation by number, date and title are set out in the <u>Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions Manual</u> (https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual) issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

Bidders who submit a bid agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the bid solicitation and accept the clauses and conditions of the resulting contract.

2.3 **Enquiries - Bid Solicitation**

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than 3 calendar days before the bid closing date. Enguiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

2.4 **Applicable Laws**

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Ontario.

Bidders may at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Bidders.

Section I: Technical Bid

In their technical bid, Bidders should demonstrate their understanding of the requirements contained in the bid solicitation and explain how they will meet these requirements. Bidders should demonstrate their capability and describe their approach in a thorough, concise and clear manner for carrying out the work.

The technical bid should address clearly and in sufficient depth the points that are subject to the evaluation criteria against which the bid will be evaluated. Simply repeating the statement contained in the bid solicitation is not sufficient. In order to facilitate the evaluation of the bid, Canada requests that Bidders address and present topics in the order of the evaluation criteria under the same headings. To avoid duplication, Bidders may refer to different sections of their bids by identifying the specific paragraph and page number where the subject topic has already been addressed.

PART 4 - EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND BASIS OF SELECTION

4.1 **Evaluation Procedures**

Canada

- Bids will be assessed in accordance with the entire requirement of the bid solicitation including the (a) technical evaluation criteria.
- An evaluation team composed of representatives of Canada will evaluate the bids. (b)

4.1.1 **Technical Evaluation**

Mandatory and point rated technical evaluation criteria are included in Appendix 1.

4.1.2 **Financial Evaluation**

Bidders should submit their financial bid on the document provided in Appendix 2 – Financial Proposal Form.

4.2 **Basis of Selection**

4.2.1 Highest Combined Rating of Technical Merit and Price

- 1. To be declared responsive, a bid must:
 - a. comply with all the requirements of the bid solicitation; and
 - b. meet all mandatory criteria; and
 - c. obtain the required minimum of 26 points overall for the technical evaluation criteria which are subject to point rating. The rating is performed on a scale of 40 points.
- 2. Bids not meeting "(a) or (b) or (c) will be declared non-responsive.
- 3. The selection will be based on the highest responsive combined rating of technical merit and price. The ratio will be 60% for the technical merit and 40% for the price.
- 4. To establish the technical merit score, the overall technical score for each responsive bid will be determined as follows: total number of points obtained / maximum number of points available multiplied by the ratio of 60%.
- To establish the pricing score, each responsive bid will be prorated against the lowest evaluated price and the ratio of 40%.
- For each responsive bid, the technical merit score and the pricing score will be added to determine its combined rating.
- 7. Neither the responsive bid obtaining the highest technical score nor the one with the lowest evaluated price will necessarily be accepted. The responsive bid with the highest combined rating of technical merit and price will be recommended for award of a contract.

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Canada

The table below illustrates an example where all three bids are responsive and the selection of the contractor is determined by a 60/40 ratio of technical merit and price, respectively. The total available points equal 135 and the lowest evaluated price is \$45,000 (45).

PART 5 – CERTIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Bidders must provide the required certifications and additional information to be awarded a contract.

The certifications provided by Bidders to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Canada will declare a bid non-responsive, or will declare a contractor in default if any certification made by the Bidder is found to be untrue, whether made knowingly or unknowingly, during the bid evaluation period or during the contract period.

The Contracting Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Bidder's certifications. Failure to comply and to cooperate with any request or requirement imposed by the Contracting Authority will render the bid non-responsive or constitute a default under the Contract.

5.1 Certifications Required with the Bid

5.2.2 Status and Availability of Resources

The Bidder certifies that, should it be awarded a contract as a result of the bid solicitation, every individual proposed in its bid will be available to perform the Work as required by Canada's representatives and at the time specified in the bid solicitation or agreed to with Canada's representatives. If for reasons beyond its control, the Bidder is unable to provide the services of an individual named in its bid, the Bidder may propose a substitute with similar qualifications and experience. The Bidder must advise the Contracting Authority of the reason for the substitution and provide the name, qualifications and experience of the proposed replacement. For the purposes of this clause, only the following reasons will be considered as beyond the control of the Bidder: death, sickness, maternity and parental leave, retirement, resignation, dismissal for cause or termination of an agreement for default.

If the Bidder has proposed any individual who is not an employee of the Bidder, the Bidder certifies that it has the permission from that individual to propose his/her services in relation to the Work to be performed and to submit his/her résumé to Canada. The Bidder must, upon request from the Contracting Authority, provide a written confirmation, signed by the individual, of the permission given to the Bidder and of his/her availability.

5.2.3 Education and Experience

The Bidder certifies that all the information provided in the résumés and supporting material submitted with its bid, particularly the information pertaining to education, achievements, experience and work history, has been verified by the Bidder to be true and accurate. Furthermore, the Bidder warrants that every individual proposed by the Bidder for the requirement is capable of performing the Work described in the resulting contract.

5.2.4 Former Public Servant

Contracts awarded to former public servants (FPS) in receipt of a pension or of a lump sum payment must bear the closest public scrutiny, and reflect fairness in the spending of public funds. In order to comply with



Treasury Board policies and directives on contracts awarded to FPSs, bidders must provide the information required below before contract award. If the answer to the questions and, as applicable the information required have not been received by the time the evaluation of bids is completed. P-36, and any increases paid pursuant to the Supplementary Retirement Benefits Act, R.S., 1985, c. S-24 as it affects the PSSA. It does not include pensions payable pursuant to the Canadian Forces Superannuation Act, R.S., 1985, c. C-17, the Defence Services Pension Continuation Act, 1970, c. D-3, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Pension Continuation Act., 1970, c. R-10, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Superannuation Act, R.S., 1985, c. R-11, the Members of Parliament Retiring Allowances Act, R.S. 1985, c. M-5, and that portion of pension payable to the Canada Pension Plan Act, R.S., 1985, c. C-8.

Mediation

If a dispute arising from this contract cannot be settled amicably through negotiation, then the parties agree in good faith to submit the dispute to mediation as administered by the Arbitration and Mediation Institute of Canada Inc. (AMIC). The parties acknowledge receipt of the rules of AMIC. The cost of mediation shall be borne equally by the parties.

Arbitration

If the parties cannot resolve the dispute through mediation within sixty (60) days, the parties agree to submit the dispute to arbitration pursuant to the Commercial Arbitration Act (Canada). The party requesting such arbitration shall do so by written notice to the other party/parties. The cost of the arbitration and fees of the arbitrator shall be borne equally by the parties. The arbitration shall take place in the city where the contractor carries on business before a single arbitrator to be chosen jointly by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on the choice of arbitrator within thirty (30) days of written notice to submit the dispute to arbitration, each party will choose a representative who will select the arbitrator.

The parties may determine the procedure to be followed by the arbitrator in conducting the proceedings, or may ask the arbitrator to do so. The arbitrator shall issue a written award within thirty (30) days of hearing the parties. The award may be entered in any court having jurisdiction and enforced as a judgment of that court.

Meaning of "Dispute"

The parties agree that the word "dispute" in this clause refers to a dispute of fact or of law, other than a dispute of public law.



The parties understand that the Procurement Ombudsman appointed pursuant to Subsection 22.1(1) of the Department of Public Works and Government Services Act will, on request or consent of the parties to participate in an alternative dispute resolution process to resolve any dispute between the parties respecting the interpretation or application of a term and condition of this contract and their consent to bear the cost of such process, provide to the parties a proposal for an alternative dispute resolution process to resolve their dispute. The Contractor will be reimbursed for the costs reasonably and properly incurred in the performance of the Work in Annex A as determined in accordance with the Basis of Payment in Annex B, to a limitation of expenditure of \$_____ Customs duties are _____ included and Applicable Taxes are extra.

7.8.2 Limitation of Expenditure

- 1. Canada's total liability to the Contractor under the Contract must not exceed \$. (Insert le amount of Limitation of Expenditure from 9.1) Customs duties are _____ included and Applicable Taxes are extra.

Inuvik Satellite Project

SW.2.0 BACKGROUND



The Inuvik Satellite Station Facility (ISSF) is owned by the Government of Canada (GoC) and managed by Natural Resources Canada (NRCan). Located above the Arctic Circle in Inuvik, Northwest Territories, it is just off the Dempster Highway, about 3 kilometres (km) from the Mike Zubko Airport (YEV) and 10 km from the Inuvik town centre. The ISSF has four 13 metre-wide (m) remote sensing antennas.

SW.3.0 OBJECTIVES

The ISSF team wants to decorate the four antennas with local Indigenous artwork. The requirement is for the production and installation of the decals on four units being done at the same time in late spring 2018.

SW.4.0 PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

SW.4.1 Tasks, deliverables, milestones and schedule

- The large format decals must be produced on media that can withstand harsh winter conditions. See • the temperature chart included.
- The decals must be applied to the satellite dishes. Instructions about which decal is for which satellite • dish will be provided.
- Installation includes removing the existing graphic on one of the dishes, cleaning and preparing the • identified satellite dishes, and installing the decals. An adjustable work platform (bucket lift/lift) will be provided. The lift will be able to accommodate two workers. The lift can be provided with or without an operator. However, operators would need to be trained/qualified operators as per NWT Apprenticeship, Trade and Occupation Certification Act. Proof of qualifications is required prior to contract award unless an operator is requested.
- Installation must be done while the dishes are stationary between "passes" because the dishes will be in use. Specifics: Each satellite dish is 13 m wide. The coverage of the decal on each satellite dish is Page 21 of - de 33



The production cost is for only these areas because the remaining area on each dish is bare.

Decals cannot be applied in an area in the centre of the satellite dish because a part of the structure is positioned there. It is represented by the circle at the centre of the diagram.

The company that built the satellite dishes provided the following diagram. It illustrates that the surface of the satellite is in sections, which will affect the production and installation of the graphics.





SW. 4.2 Required resources: The installation personnel on-site must have experience in applying decals outdoors, within the past five years, during Canada's spring and have experience installing decals on to multi-sectional technical equipment.

Temperatures: The following table lists temperature information for Inuvik from the GoC website. This information will help in the selection of the material used for the large format decals and help in planning their installation.

SW. 4.3 Reporting requirements

Before NRCan awards the contract, the material proposed for the decals must be reviewed. Technical data sheets must be provided. This information will be vetted by the company that built the satellite dish. Their approval is required. Cast wrap vinyl or similar material will work.

During the installation, daily updates that include pictures are required.

SW. 4.4 Method and source of acceptance

All deliverables and services rendered under any contract are subject to inspection by the Project Authority and/or the appointed representative. The Project Authority shall have the right to reject any deliverables that are not considered satisfactory or that require correction before payment will be authorized.

SW. 4.5 Specifications and standards

An estimate is required of the time needed to produce the large format decals. Also, an estimate is required of the time needed to install the decals, which must take into consideration the location and that the work must be done when the satellite dishes are stationary between passes. The satellite dishes will be functioning during installation because it is not possible to take them off-line.



The project is considered complete when all the artwork has been produced in the large format required for satellite dishes and all the installation has been done. Verification of completion must be supported with photos of the satellite dishes showing the correct and completed installation. The completion will be verified by the Project Authority or appointed representative.

SW. 4.6 Technical, operational and organizational environment

Situated above the Arctic Circle, the ISSF is strategically positioned to track and receive data in real-time from polar-orbiting satellites for scientific, mapping, weather, surveillance and other purposes. Canada's weather in the North in late spring is the key factor for the selection of production materials and the timing and execution of the installation. Another factor is that the satellite dishes will be functioning at this time. This is the reality of the installation environment.

Walking on the surface of the satellite dish is not permitted.

No chemicals are used to prepare the reflector surface. The manufacturer recommends just using non-abrasive soap and water making sure to rinse all the soap off with clear water before starting the application of the decal.

The following schedule is a typical day for one of the satellite dishes. The schedule will change every day because it is coordinated with the passing of a particular satellite. This example shows the extent of the interruptions to the installation process that the passes cause. During the times noted, the satellite dish is moving and cannot be accessed for installation. The movement of the satellite dish must not be hindered in any way. Installation schedules will be provided.

The proximity of bears and other dangerous wildlife can affect the installation. Personnel need to be very cautious. Contact the ISSF security personnel for safety advice. SW.5.0 OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SW.5.1 Contractor's obligations

ANNEX "C" – Insurance Requirements

- 1. The Contractor must obtain Commercial General Liability Insurance, and maintain it in force throughout the duration of the Contract, in an amount usual for a contract of this nature, but for not less than \$2,000,000 per accident or occurrence and in the annual aggregate.
- 2. The Commercial General Liability policy must include the following:
 - a. Additional Insured: Canada is added as an additional insured, but only with respect to liability arising out of the Contractor's performance of the Contract. The interest of Canada should read as follows: Canada, as represented by Natural Resources Canada.
 - b. Bodily Injury and Property Damage to third parties arising out of the operations of the Contractor.
 - c. Products and Completed Operations: Coverage for bodily injury or property damage arising out of goods or products manufactured, sold, handled, or distributed by the Contractor and/or arising out of operations that have been completed by the Contractor.
 - d. Personal Injury: While not limited to, the coverage must include Violation of Privacy, Libel and Slander, False Arrest, Detention or Imprisonment and Defamation of Character.
 - e. Cross Liability/Separation of Insureds: Without increasing the limit of liability, the policy must protect all insured parties to the full extent of coverage provided. Further, the policy must apply to each Insured in the same manner and to the same extent as if a separate policy had been issued to each.
 - f. Blanket Contractual Liability: The policy must, on a blanket basis or by specific reference to the Contract, extend to assumed liabilities with respect to contractual provisions.
 - g. Employees and, if applicable, Volunteers must be included as Additional Insured.
 - h. Employers' Liability (or confirmation that all employees are covered by Worker's compensation (WSIB) or similar program)
 - i. Broad Form Property Damage including Completed Operations: Expands the Property Damage coverage to include certain losses that would otherwise be excluded by the standard care, custody or control exclusion found in a standard policy.
 - j. Notice of Cancellation: The Insurer will endeavour to provide the Contracting Authority thirty (30) days written notice of policy cancellation.
 - k. If the policy is written on a claims-made basis, coverage must be in place for a period of at least 12 months after the completion or termination of the Contract.
 - I. Owners' or Contractors' Protective Liability: Covers the damages that the Contractor becomes legally obligated to pay arising out of the operations of a subcontractor.
 - m. Sudden and Accidental Pollution Liability (minimum 120 hours): To protect the Contractor for liabilities arising from damages caused by accidental pollution incidents.
 - n. Litigation Rights: Pursuant to subsection 5(d) of the <u>Department of Justice Act</u>, S.C. 1993, c. J-2, s.1, if a suit is instituted for or against Canada which the Insurer would, but for this clause, have the right to pursue or defend on behalf of Canada as an Additional Named Insured under the insurance policy, the Insurer must promptly contact the Attorney General of Canada to agree on the legal strategies by sending a letter, by registered mail or by courier, with an acknowledgement of receipt.




