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PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Introduction

The bid solicitation is divided into seven parts plus attachments and annexes, as follows:

- Part 1 General Information: provides a general description of the requirement;
- Part 2 Bidder Instructions: provides the instructions, clauses and conditions applicable to the bid solicitation;
- Part 3 Bid Preparation Instructions: provides Bidders with instructions on how to prepare their bid;
- Part 4 Evaluation Procedures and Basis of Selection: indicates how the evaluation will be conducted, the evaluation criteria that must be addressed in the bid, and the basis of selection;
- Part 5 Certifications and Additional Information: includes the certifications and additional information to be provided;
- Part 6 Security, Financial and Other Requirements: includes specific requirements that must be addressed by Bidders; and
- Part 7 Resulting Contract Clauses: includes the clauses and conditions that will apply to any resulting contract.

The Annexes include the Statement of Work, the Basis of Payment, the Electronic Payment Instruments, the Federal Contractors Program for Employment Equity - Certification, the Insurance Requirements, Travel and Living Guidelines, and Code of Conduct Certification.

1.2 Summary

Title: Cod Sentinel Survey - 2J, 3KL and 3Ps

Public Services and Procurement Canada (PSPC) has a requirement, on behalf of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), for the provision of a cod sentinel survey, as specified in the Statement of Work at Annex A.

- 1.2.3 The requirement is limited to Canadian goods and/or services.
- 1.2.4 The Federal Contractors Program (FCP) for employment equity applies to this procurement; refer to Part 5 – Certifications and Additional Information, Part 7 - Resulting Contract Clauses and the annex titled Federal Contractors Program for Employment Equity - Certification.

1.3 Debriefings

Bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days from receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.

1.4 Comprehensive Land Claims Agreement(s)

This procurement is subject to the following Comprehensive Land Claims Agreement(s):
- Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement.

1.5 Trade Agreements

The requirement is subject to the provisions of the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA).

PART 2 - BIDDER INSTRUCTIONS

2.1 Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the bid solicitation by number, date and title are set out in the [Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions Manual](https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual) (<https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual>) issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

Bidders who submit a bid agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the bid solicitation and accept the clauses and conditions of the resulting contract.

The [2003](#) (2017-04-27) Standard Instructions - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, are incorporated by reference into and form part of the bid solicitation.

Subsection 5.4 of [2003](#), Standard Instructions - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, is amended as follows:

2.2 Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted only to Public Works and Government Services Canada (PWGSC) Bid Receiving Unit by the date, time and place indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation.

Due to the nature of the bid solicitation, bids transmitted by facsimile to PWGSC will not be accepted.

2.3 Former Public Servant - Competitive Bid

Contracts awarded to former public servants (FPS) in receipt of a pension or of a lump sum payment must bear the closest public scrutiny, and reflect fairness in the spending of public funds. In order to comply with Treasury Board policies and directives on contracts awarded to FPSs, bidders must provide the information required below before contract award. If the answer to the questions and, as applicable the information required have not been received by the time the evaluation of bids is completed, Canada will inform the Bidder of a time frame within which to provide the information. Failure to comply with Canada's request and meet the requirement within the prescribed time frame will render the bid non-responsive.

Definitions

For the purposes of this clause, "former public servant" is any former member of a department as defined in the [Financial Administration Act](#), R.S., 1985, c. F-11, a former member of the Canadian Armed Forces or a former member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. A former public servant may be:

- a. an individual;
- b. an individual who has incorporated;
- c. a partnership made of former public servants; or
- d. a sole proprietorship or entity where the affected individual has a controlling or major interest in the entity.

"lump sum payment period" means the period measured in weeks of salary, for which payment has been made to facilitate the transition to retirement or to other employment as a result of the

implementation of various programs to reduce the size of the Public Service. The lump sum payment period does not include the period of severance pay, which is measured in a like manner. "pension" means a pension or annual allowance paid under the Public Service Superannuation Act (PSSA), R.S., 1985, c. P-36, and any increases paid pursuant to the Supplementary Retirement Benefits Act, R.S., 1985, c. S-24 as it affects the PSSA. It does not include pensions payable pursuant to the Canadian Forces Superannuation Act, R.S., 1985, c. C-17, the Defence Services Pension Continuation Act, 1970, c. D-3, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Pension Continuation Act, 1970, c. R-10, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Superannuation Act, R.S., 1985, c. R-11, the Members of Parliament Retiring Allowances Act, R.S. 1985, c. M-5, and that portion of pension payable to the Canada Pension Plan Act, R.S., 1985, c. C-8.

2.4 Enquiries - Bid Solicitation

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than 7 calendar days before the bid closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

2.5 Applicable Laws

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Newfoundland and Labrador.

Bidders may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Bidders.

2.6 Basis for Canada's Ownership of Intellectual Property

The Department of Fisheries and Oceans has determined that any intellectual property rights arising from the performance of the Work under the resulting contract will belong to Canada, for the following reasons, as set out in the [*Policy on Title to Intellectual Property Arising Under Crown Procurement Contracts*](#):

- the main purpose of the Contract, or of the deliverables contracted for, is to generate knowledge and information for public dissemination;

PART 3 - BID PREPARATION INSTRUCTIONS

3.1 Bid Preparation Instructions

Due to the nature of the bid solicitation, bids transmitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

Canada requests that bidders provide their bid in separately bound sections as follows:

Section II: Financial Bid (4 hard copies)

Section III: Certifications (1 hard copy)

Section IV: Additional Information (completed and returned as part of the RFP document)

This RFP document must be signed on page 1 and clauses completed where fill-ins appear in the document. Return the signed and completed document as part of your bid package.

Canada requests that bidders follow the format instructions described below in the preparation of hard copy of their bid:

- (a) use 8.5 x 11 inch (216 mm x 279 mm) paper;
- (b) use a numbering system that corresponds to the bid solicitation.

In April 2006, Canada issued a policy directing federal departments and agencies to take the necessary steps to incorporate environmental considerations into the procurement process **Policy on Green Procurement** (<http://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/ecologisation-greening/achats-procurement/politique-policy-eng.html>). To assist Canada in reaching its objectives, bidders should:

- 1) use 8.5 x 11 inch (216 mm x 279 mm) paper containing fibre certified as originating from a sustainably-managed forest and containing minimum 30% recycled content; and
- 2) use an environmentally-preferable format including black and white printing instead of colour printing, printing double sided/duplex, using staples or clips instead of cerlox, duotangs or binders.

Section I: Technical Bid

In their technical bid, Bidders should demonstrate their understanding of the requirements contained in the bid solicitation and explain how they will meet these requirements. Bidders should demonstrate their capability and describe their approach in a thorough, concise and clear manner for carrying out the work.

The technical bid should address clearly and in sufficient depth the points that are subject to the evaluation criteria against which the bid will be evaluated. Simply repeating the statement contained in the bid solicitation is not sufficient. In order to facilitate the evaluation of the bid, Canada requests that Bidders address and present topics in the order of the evaluation criteria under the same headings. To avoid duplication, Bidders may refer to different sections of their bids by identifying the specific paragraph and page number where the subject topic has already been addressed.

Management Bid

In their management bid, Bidders must describe their capability and experience, the project management team and provide client contact(s).

Section II: Financial Bid

3.1.1 Bidders must submit their financial bid in accordance with the Basis of Payment in Annex B.

3.1.2 Electronic Payment of Invoices – Bid

If you are willing to accept payment of invoices by Electronic Payment Instruments, complete Annex "X" Electronic Payment Instruments, to identify which ones are accepted.

If Annex "D" Electronic Payment Instruments is not completed, it will be considered as if Electronic Payment Instruments are not being accepted for payment of invoices.

Acceptance of Electronic Payment Instruments will not be considered as an evaluation criterion.

Section III: Certifications

PART 4 - EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND BASIS OF SELECTION

4.1 Evaluation Procedures

- (a) Bids will be assessed in accordance with the entire requirement of the bid solicitation including the technical, management, financial evaluation criteria.
- (b) An evaluation team composed of representatives of Canada will evaluate the bids.

4.1.2 Financial Evaluation

SACC Manual Clause [A0220T](#) (2014-06-26), Evaluation of Price

4.2.1 Basis of Selection – Minimum Point Rating

To be declared responsive, a bid must:

- a. comply with all the requirements of the bid solicitation; and
- b. meet all mandatory technical evaluation criteria; and
- c. obtain the required minimum of seventy (70) percent overall of the points for the technical evaluation criteria which are subject to point rating. The rating is performed on a scale of one hundred points.

Bids not meeting (a) or (b) or (c) will be declared non-responsive. The responsive bid with the lowest evaluated price will be recommended for award of a contract.

PART 5 – CERTIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Bidders must provide the required certifications and additional information to be awarded a contract.

The certifications provided by Bidders to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Unless specified otherwise, Canada will declare a bid non-responsive, or will declare a contractor in default if any certification made by the Bidder is found to be untrue, whether made knowingly or unknowingly, during the bid evaluation period or during the contract period.

The Contracting Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Bidder's certifications. Failure to comply and to cooperate with any request or requirement imposed by the Contracting Authority will render the bid non-responsive or constitute a default under the Contract.

5.1 Certifications Required with the Bid

Bidders must submit the following duly completed certifications as part of their bid.

5.1.1 Integrity Provisions - Declaration of Convicted Offences

5.2 Certifications Precedent to Contract Award and Additional Information

If any of these required certifications or additional information is not completed and submitted as requested, the Contracting Authority will inform the Bidder of a time frame within which to provide the information. Failure to provide the certifications or the additional information listed below within the time frame specified will render the bid non-responsive.

STATEMENT OF WORK

2018/2019 2J3KLPs and 4R3Pn Cod Sentinel

Sentinel surveys have been conducted in the inshore areas of Newfoundland and Labrador (NAFO Divisions 2J3KLPs and 4R3Pn) since 1995. They are collaborative science projects between Fisheries and Oceans and industry organizations that were developed in order to augment Science information on inshore cod stocks. These projects provide valuable catch rate and biological information on cod, as well as provide platforms for other research initiatives, including mark and recapture work that gives information on fish mortality and movement.

There are approximately (50) survey platforms (enterprises) required to conduct to the sentinel survey in NAFO divisions 2J3KLPs and approximately (18) survey platforms required for the sentinel survey in NAFO divisions 4R3Pn. Participants are selected by the contractor based on the following criteria developed in consultation with DFO: Core Harvester designation, Groundfish licence holder and resident of the appropriate geographic area with an attachment to the fishery in that area. The contractor shall endeavor to have participants remain with the project over a number of years to minimize data variability. The contractor must have the ability and technical resources to determine that these criteria are met, as well as a physical presence at strategic locations in the province to provide administrative support to project participants.

Around Fifteen (65) vessels are fixed gear (gill nets, line trawls, hand lines), inshore fishing boats, and three (3) vessels are 45-65 foot longliners equipped for otter trawling operating in NAFO Divisions 2J3KL4R and Subdivisions 3Ps and 3Pn.

The Sentinel Mobile 3Pn, 4RST survey generally consists of 300 stations (30 minute tows of a 300 Star Balloon trawl mounted on a Rock Hopper footgear), of which 150 are realized in 3Pn and 4R NAFO Divisions by Newfoundland trawlers.

A list of main and alternate stations with tow positions will be provided by DFO – Science, however it is the skipper's responsibility to make sure that a position is trawlable.

The contractor must supply all fixed fishing gear including boats and crew. Mobile gear (Star Balloon 300 mounted on Rock Hopper gear, 145 mm with a lining at the codend of 40 mm) will be supplied and maintained by the contractor.

Prior to the start of survey work, the contractor must provide fishing enterprise information including the owner/operators name, vessel name, LOA, CFV #, and names of crew members. In the event that an owner/operator must use a designate for vessel operation, the contractor will notify the DFO Scientific Authority and DFO Conservation and Protection Branch in writing prior to any survey work being undertaken by the designate.

Participants in the cod sentinel program will collect biological data: lengths, weights, sex and otoliths for age-determination. They will also record the presence of by-catch species and environmental conditions as listed on log sheets.

The contractor will provide a biologist and technicians trained by DFO personnel and who have data collection experience, to assist in training participants, collecting data and monitoring at-sea scientific activity. These personnel should be deployed at several locations to allow easy access to a number of sentinel sites. When DFO staff plan to accompany sentinel survey enterprises, the DFO Authority will provide a date and time for departure from the wharf. In the event the DFO Authority is not present on the wharf at the scheduled date and departure time and has not notified the owner/operator of any changes, the owner operator will wait for one (1) hour past the scheduled time of departure before leaving without the DFO Authority.

Survey Duration

The sentinel survey will operate over the period April 1 2018 to March 31 2019. Survey weeks must be allocated according to Fishing Plans agreed upon by the DFO Scientific Authority and the Project Partner.

Fishing Plans must be discussed, developed and agreed upon in writing by sentinel participants and the Fishermen's Committees in the communities in which the sentinel participant works. However, the DFO Authority reserves the right to amend the plan for scientific or safety reasons.

Gill Net / Line Trawl Component

Gill nets and/or Line trawls are used in the survey for a majority of the fishing days. Sampling of the catch will be performed a minimum of two (2) days per week. Hand lines may be used only in conjunction with gill nets or trawls. Fishing gear must be maintained in fully operational condition for the duration of the survey.

The contractor is responsible for securing and supplying bait for fishing operations.

DFO Science will supply scientific instruments (temperature sensor, scale), data forms, data base and fish measuring boards.

Deliverables

The following deliverables must be met for this project:

- 1) Summary of activities carried out (number of activities per site).
- 2) All data collected (database, information on activities, catches, frequencies, lengths, conditions and other), otoliths, fish or other samples required by scientific protocol or special sampling. Samples must be clearly identified with date, fishing location, name of vessel and project number and sent to DFO at our request.

Reporting

The Harmonized Sales Tax (HST) must be reported for all eligible components in the contract on every progress claim. HST must be reported separately for each enterprise in the survey.
