B) Bidder Questions and Answers

Q1:

Can PCA provide the screening level review report mentioned in the Statement of Work?

A1:

Yes. See attached "Screening Level Review of 30 and 30A Bear Rock Dr Tulita NWT.pdf", prepared as of August 2020 by Parks Canada's Environmental Management Services.

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Q2:

Please provide an exact location for the AST mentioned in the addendum (02). Is the only APEC to be considered in this Phase II ESA the former AST location alongside the main residence (Northwest corner of the house)?

A2:

The former AST is located at the northwest corner of the house – refer to attachment "2 - Sample Sites_former Oil tank June26 2020" in RFP supporting documents, and refer to photograph 7 in Wood report.

The APECs or areas of potential environmental concern – is not exclusively the one (1) former AST near the main residence. As mentioned in the Screening Level Review report, additional APECs include but not limited to: Historical Data Gap Analysis and Lead- and Asbestos- Containing Materials requiring additional screening. However, the Screening Level Review report was prepared as a very high level assessment and there is still a fair bit of uncertainty with respect to historical use.

For this contract, the primary area of investigation of APECS should focus in on the area surrounding the former AST by the main residence. Full delineation of contamination in the area of former AST is required. After contract award, we will rely on consultant's professional opinion as to whether there are any other potential sources of contamination at the site that can be identified, and that would benefit from further investigative work.

Q3:

ALS laboratory Certificate of Analysis (L2454664) indicate "SOIL" in the description for Samples L2454664-8, L2454664-9, L2454664-10. The statement of work mentions PCA sampling the exterior paint and Chain of Custody form indicates paint chips, but the analytical results indicate Soil for these samples (in description). Please clarify. Also, it appears that a soil sample was taken close to the white shed (presumably L2354664-1), could we get the exact sampling location on a drawing please?

A3:

- (1) The samples L2454664-#'s -8 -9 -10 are paint samples from three separate buildings. Confirmed by the client ID matching the technician's sample notes and the analytical results the analysis was done for lead in the paint.
- (2) Refer to the attached file "20-108-PC TOPO TULITA UTM Z10_print11x17_sample points labelled.pdf", as topographic survey with the samples locations, labelled as per the sample IDs from ALS Laboratory Results L2454664 and L2467883.
- (3) As well refer to following comments re: samples labelled:

Surface Soil Samples obtained June 27, 2020 and analyzed on July 7:

- Samples L2467883 (#1 through #8) for hydrocarbons: labelled with purple x
- Sample L2467883-9 was a particle size analysis: labelled with purple o.
- These samples were targeted around the area where the old house oil tank was located.
- Refer also to previously –supplied Reference Supporting Documents "2 Sample Sites_former Oil tank_June26_2020.ppt" for visual reference on the June 2020 sample locations in vicinity of former AST for L2467883 sample numbers 1-8. Sampling locations from June 2020 were also marked with pegs / pink flags in the ground so the contractor will be able to find them.

Surface Paint Chip samples collected May 27, 2020:

- Samples L2454664 -8 -9 and -10 were paint chip samples.
- Refer to labels on the buildings they were collected from, and descriptions for colours of paint sampled in analytical results.

Surface Soil Samples collected May 27, 2020 near central shed (white):

- Sample L2454664 -1 is labelled with black x.
- Sample L2454664 -11 and -12 are labelled in orange.

*NOTE:

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Surface Soils Samples L2454664 -2, -3, -6, -7 were taken on May 27, 2020. No analytical results for samples L2454664 -4, -5. Samples L2454664-2 through -7 were exploratory, and fall within the same sampling area of L2467883 (#1 through #8) which are associated with sampling re-done on June 27.

B. Amend the Basis of Selection

- B.1 <u>Delete 4.2. Basis of Selection Highest Combined Rating of Indigenous Benefits (20%) and Price (90%) in its entirety and replace with:</u>
- 4.2. Basis of Selection Highest Combined Rating of Indigenous Benefits (20%) and Price (80%)
- **4.2.1.** To be declared responsive, a bid must:
 - a. comply with all the requirements of the bid solicitation; and
 - b. meet all mandatory criteria at Annex G to Part 4 of the Bid Solicitation.
- **4.2.2.** Bids not meeting (a) and (b) will be declared non-responsive.
- **4.2.3.** The selection will be based on the highest responsive combined rating of Indigenous benefits and price. The ratio will be 20% for the Indigenous benefits and 80% for the price.
- **4.2.4.** To establish the Indigenous benefits score, the overall Indigenous benefits score for each responsive bid will be determined as follows: total number of points obtained / maximum number of points available multiplied by the ratio of 20%.
- **4.2.5.** To establish the pricing score, each responsive bid will be prorated against the lowest evaluated price and the ratio of 80%.
- **4.2.6.** For each responsive bid, the Indigenous benefits score and the pricing score will be added to determine its combined rating.
- **4.2.7.** Neither the responsive bid obtaining the highest Indigenous benefits score nor the one with the lowest evaluated price will necessarily be accepted. The responsive bid with the highest combined rating of Indigenous benefits and price will be recommended for award of a contract.

The table below illustrates an example where all three bids are responsive and the selection of the contractor is determined by a 20/80 ratio of Indigenous benefits and price, respectively. The total available points equals 100 and the lowest evaluated price is \$45,000 (45).

PART B INDIGENOUS BENEFITS PLAN NON-COMPLIANCE CONDITIONS

- 1. Under the provisions of the Contract, where the Contractor meets the IBP guarantees specified and certified in its bid, the Contractor will be paid the agreed contract price.
- 2. If the Contractor fails to fulfill their guarantee of the IBP, an amount of up to the assessed value of the guarantee may be deducted from the hold back provisions or final payment.
- 3. The amounts deducted will be determined based on the difference between the assessed value of the guarantee and the value of fulfilled portion of the guarantee.

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indicate if any objectives were not met, identify why not, explain how the situation will be remedied and what the timeframe will be for the plan to be met.

3.3 Indigenous Benefits Plan Final Report

The Contractor must provide a detailed final report on the Indigenous Benefits accomplished throughout the project. This report must be provided to the Project Authority prior to final payment.

PART B EVALUATION CRITERIA

1. Evaluation & Assessment of IBP

A total of up to 100 points will be awarded for the inclusion of an IBP. This will be worth 20% of the total bid evaluation.

For a bid to be assigned points for guarantees made in respect of any IBP evaluation criteria, the Bidder must provide proof with their bid to demonstrate how they will meet the objective of each criterion. Bidders may follow the attached Guarantee Table to supplement the IBP submission provided in their bid.
