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PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Security Requirements

A. There is no security requirement applicable to this bid solicitation.

1.2 Requirement

A. The requirement is detailed under Article 6.2 – Statement of Requirement of the resulting contract clauses.

1.3 Debriefings

A. Bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days from receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.

1.4 Trade Agreements

A. The requirement is subject to the provisions of the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA), the Canada-Korea Free Trade Agreement, the Canada-Chile Free Trade Agreement (CCFTA), the Canada-Colombia Free Trade Agreement, the Canada-Panama Free Trade Agreement, and the Canada-Honduras Free Trade Agreement.



PART 2 - BIDDER INSTRUCTIONS

2.1 Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

- A. All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the bid solicitation by number, date and title are set out in the *Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions (SACC) Manual* (<https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual>) issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.
- B. Bidders who submit a bid agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the bid solicitation and accept the clauses and conditions of the resulting contract.
- C. The 2003 (2020-05-28), Standard Instructions - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, are incorporated by reference into and form part of the bid solicitation, with the following modification(s):
- (i) Section 02, Procurement Business Number, is deleted in its entirety;
 - (ii) Section 05, Submission of bids, subsection 2, paragraph d., is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
 - d. send its bid only to the Department of National Defence location specified on page 1 of the bid solicitation or to the address specified in the bid solicitation.
 - (iii) Section 05, Submission of bids, subsection 2, paragraph e., is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
 - e. ensure that the Bidder's name, return address, the bid solicitation number, and bid solicitation closing date and time are clearly visible on the bid; and
 - (iv) Section 05, Submission of bids, subsection 4, is amended as follows:
 - Delete: 60 days
 - Insert: 90 days
 - (v) Section 06, Late bids, is deleted in its entirety;
 - (vi) Section 07, Delayed bids, is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
 - 07 Delayed bids
 - 1. It is the Bidder's responsibility to ensure that the Contracting Authority has received the entire submission. Misrouting or other electronic delivery issues resulting in late submission of bids will not be accepted.
 - (vii) Section 08, Transmission by facsimile, is deleted in its entirety; and
 - (viii) Section 20, Further information, is deleted in its entirety.

2.2 Submission of Bids

- A. Bids must be submitted only to the Department of National Defence (DND) by the date, time, and place indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation.
- B. Due to the nature of the bid solicitation, bids transmitted by facsimile will not be accepted.



2.2.1 Electronic Submissions

- A. **Individual e-mails that may include certain scripts, formats, embedded macros and/or links, or those that exceed five (5) megabytes may be rejected by Canada's e-mail system and/or firewall(s) without notice to the Bidder or Contracting Authority.** Larger bids may be submitted through more than one e-mail. Canada will confirm receipt of documents. It is the Bidder's responsibility to ensure that their entire submission has been received. Bidders should not assume that all documents have been received unless Canada confirms receipt of each document. In order to minimize the potential for technical issues, bidders are requested to allow sufficient time before the closing date and time to confirm receipt. Bid documents **submitted** after the closing time and date will not be accepted.

2.3 Enquiries - Bid Solicitation

- A. All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than 15 calendar days before the bid closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.
- B. Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

2.4 Applicable Laws

- A. Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in **Ontario OR [insert the name of the province or territory]**.
- B. Bidders may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Bidders.

2.5 Bid Challenge and Recourse Mechanisms

- (a) Several mechanisms are available to potential suppliers to challenge aspects of the procurement process up to and including contract award.
- (b) Canada encourages suppliers to first bring their concerns to the attention of the Contracting Authority. Canada's [Buy and Sell](#) website, under the heading "[Bid Challenge and Recourse Mechanisms](#)" contains information on potential complaint bodies such as:
- Office of the Procurement Ombudsman (OPO)
 - Canadian International Trade Tribunal (CITT)
- (c) Suppliers should note that there are **strict deadlines** for filing complaints, and the time periods vary depending on the complaint body in question. Suppliers should therefore act quickly when they want to challenge any aspect of the procurement process.



PART 3 - BID PREPARATION INSTRUCTIONS

3.1 Bid Preparation Instructions

- A. Canada requests that Bidders provide their bid in separately bound sections as follows:
- Section I: Technical Bid: one (1) soft copy in PDF format by e-mail;
- Section II: Financial Bid: one (1) soft copy in PDF format by e-mail;
- Section III: Certifications: one (1) soft copy in PDF format by e-mail; and
- Section IV: Additional Information: one (1) soft copy in PDF format by e-mail.
- B. Prices must appear in the financial bid only. No prices must be indicated in any other section of the bid.
- C. Canada requests that Bidders follow the format instructions described below in the preparation of their bid:
- (i) Use 8.5 x 11 inch (216 mm x 279 mm) paper; and
 - (ii) Use a numbering system that corresponds to the bid solicitation.

3.2 Section I: Technical Bid

- A. In their technical bid, Bidders should explain and demonstrate how they propose to meet the requirements and how they will carry out the Work.

3.3 Section II: Financial Bid

- A. Bidders must submit their financial bid in accordance with the Pricing Schedule detailed in Attachment 1 to Part 3.

3.3.1 Electronic Payment of Invoices - Bid

- A. If you are willing to accept payment of invoices by Electronic Payment Instruments, complete Attachment 2 to Part 3, Electronic Payment Instruments, to identify which ones are accepted.
- B. If Attachment 2 to Part 3, Electronic Payment Instruments is not completed, it will be considered as if Electronic Payment Instruments are not being accepted for payment of invoices.
- C. Acceptance of Electronic Payment Instruments will not be considered as an evaluation criterion.

3.3.2 Exchange Rate Fluctuation

- A. The requirement does not offer exchange rate fluctuation risk mitigation. Requests for exchange rate fluctuation risk mitigation will not be considered. All bids including such provision will render the bid non-responsive.

3.4 Section III: Certifications

- A. Bidders must submit the certifications and additional information required under Part 5.



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3.5 Section IV: Additional Information

A. In Section IV of their bid, bidders should provide:

- (i) A completed, signed, and dated Page 1 of this solicitation;
- (ii) The name of the contact person (provide also this person's title, mailing address, phone number, and email address) authorized by the Bidder to enter into communications with Canada with regards to their bid, and any contract that may result from their bid;
- (iii) For Part 2, article 2.4, Applicable Laws, of the bid solicitation: the province or territory if different than specified; and
- (iv) Any other information submitted in the bid not already detailed.

**ATTACHMENT 1 TO PART 3 - PRICING SCHEDULE**

- A. The Bidder must complete this pricing schedule and include it in its financial bid.
- B. The volumetric data included in this pricing schedule are provided for bid evaluated price determination purposes only. They are not to be considered as a contractual guarantee. Their inclusion in this pricing schedule does not represent a commitment by Canada that Canada's future usage of the services described in the bid solicitation will be consistent with this data.
- C. The firm rates specified below includes all expenses that may need to be incurred to satisfy the terms of any contract that may result from its bid, including the total estimated cost of any travel and living expenses that may need to be incurred for the Work described in Annex A, Statement of Work of the bid solicitation.
- D. Under any resulting contract, Canada will not accept travel and living expenses that may need to be incurred by the contractor for any relocation of resources required to satisfy its contractual obligations.
- E. All prices and costs must be submitted in Canadian Dollars, delivered at Place (DAP) Incoterm 2010. The Contractor is responsible for export clearance, delivery charges, administration, costs and risks of transport. Canada is responsible for all import clearance, including the payment of applicable duties and taxes. Zero rated for Goods and Services Tax (GST) or Harmonized Sales Tax (HST). Provincial sales taxes are not applicable.

PART 4 - EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND BASIS OF SELECTION

4.1 Evaluation Procedures

- A. Bids will be assessed in accordance with the entire requirement of the bid solicitation including the technical and financial evaluation criteria.
- B. An evaluation team composed of representatives of Canada will evaluate the bids.

4.1.1 Technical Evaluation

4.1.1.1 Mandatory Technical Criteria

- A. The following mandatory technical criteria must be demonstrated with supporting documentation in the form of certifications which must be provided with the Bidder's response at the time of bid submission. Failure to submit supporting documentation that clearly demonstrates the mandatory technical criteria listed below, may render the bid non-compliant and will not be given further consideration. Any information proposed as options or additions to the work will NOT be evaluated.

4.1.2 Financial Evaluation

- A. The price of the bid will be evaluated as follows:
 - (i) Canadian-based bidders must submit firm prices, Canadian customs duties and excise taxes included, and Applicable Taxes excluded; and
 - (ii) Foreign-based bidders must submit firm prices, Canadian customs duties, excise taxes and Applicable Taxes excluded. Canadian customs duties and excise taxes payable by Canada will be added, for evaluation purposes only, to the prices submitted by foreign-based bidders.
- B. Unless the bid solicitation specifically requires bids to be submitted in Canadian currency, bids submitted in foreign currency will be converted to Canadian currency for evaluation purposes. The rate given by the Bank of Canada in effect on the bid solicitation closing date, or on another date specified in the bid solicitation, will be applied as a conversion factor to the bids submitted in foreign currency.
- C. Although Canada reserves the right to award the Contract either on an FOB plant or FOB destination, Canada requests that bidders provide prices FOB their plant or shipping point and FOB destination. Bids will be assessed on an FOB destination basis.
- D. For the purpose of the bid solicitation, bidders with an address in Canada are considered Canadian-based bidders and bidders with an address outside of Canada are considered foreign-based bidders.



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4.2 Basis of Selection - Lowest Evaluated Price, Mandatory Technical Criteria

- A. A bid must comply with the requirements of the bid solicitation and meet all mandatory technical evaluation criteria to be declared responsive. The responsive bid with the lowest evaluated price will be recommended for award of a contract.
- B. Should two (2) or more responsive bids achieve an identical lowest evaluated price, the earliest bid received based on the date and time stamp of the email will be recommended for award of a contract.



PART 5 - CERTIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- A. Bidders must provide the required certifications and additional information to be awarded a contract.
- B. The certifications provided by Bidders to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Unless specified otherwise, Canada will declare a bid non-responsive, or will declare a contractor in default if any certification made by the Bidder is found to be untrue, whether made knowingly or unknowingly, during the bid evaluation period or during the contract period.
- C. The Contracting Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Bidder's certifications. Failure to comply and to cooperate with any request or requirement imposed by the Contracting Authority will render the bid non-responsive or constitute a default under the Contract.

5.1 Certifications Required with the Bid

- A. Bidders must submit the following duly completed certifications as part of their bid.

5.1.1 Integrity Provisions - Declaration of Convicted Offences

- A. In accordance with the Integrity Provisions of the Standard Instructions, all bidders must provide with their bid, **if applicable**, the Integrity declaration form available on the [Forms for the Integrity Regime](http://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/ci-if/declaration-eng.html) website (<http://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/ci-if/declaration-eng.html>), to be given further consideration in the procurement process.

5.2 Certifications Precedent to Contract Award and Additional Information

- A. The certifications and additional information listed below should be submitted with the bid but may be submitted afterwards. If any of these required certifications or additional information is not completed and submitted as requested, the Contracting Authority will inform the Bidder of a time frame within which to provide the information. Failure to provide the certifications or the additional information listed below within the time frame specified will render the bid non-responsive.

5.2.1 Integrity Provisions - Required Documentation

- A. In accordance with the section titled "Information to be provided when bidding, contracting, or entering into a real procurement agreement" of the [Ineligibility and Suspension Policy](http://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/ci-if/politique-policy-eng.html) (<http://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/ci-if/politique-policy-eng.html>), the Bidder must provide the required documentation, as applicable, to be given further consideration in the procurement process.

5.3 Federal Contractors Program for Employment Equity - Bid Certification

- A. 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- B. Canada will have the right to declare a bid non-responsive if the Bidder, or any member of the Bidder if the Bidder is a Joint Venture, appears on the “FCP Limited Eligibility to Bid” list at the time of contract award.



PART 6 - RESULTING CONTRACT CLAUSES

The following clauses and conditions apply to and form part of any contract resulting from the bid solicitation.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT

6.1 Security Requirements

- A. There is no security requirement applicable to the Contract.

6.2 Requirement

- A. The Contractor must provide the item(s) detailed under the Requirement at Annex A.

6.2.1 Optional Goods and/or Services

- A. The Contractor grants to Canada the irrevocable option to acquire the goods, services, or both described at Annex A, Requirement, of the Contract under the same conditions and at the prices and/or rates stated in the Contract. The option may only be exercised by the Contracting Authority and will be evidenced, for administrative purposes only, through a contract amendment.
- B. The Contracting Authority may exercise the option at any time before the expiry of the Contract by sending a written notice to the Contractor.

6.3 Standard Clauses and Conditions

- A. All clauses and conditions identified in the Contract by number, date and title are set out in the [Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions \(SACC\) Manual](https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual) (<https://buyandsell.gc.ca/policy-and-guidelines/standard-acquisition-clauses-and-conditions-manual>) issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

6.3.1 General Conditions

- A. 2010A (2020-05-28), General Conditions - Goods (Medium Complexity), apply to and form part of the Contract, with the following modification:
- (i) Article 01, Interpretation, "Canada", "Crown", "Her Majesty" or "the Government", is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

"Canada", "Crown", "Her Majesty" or "the Government"
means Her Majesty the Queen in right of Canada as represented by the Minister of National Defence and any other person duly authorized to act on behalf of that minister or, if applicable, an appropriate minister to whom the Minister of National Defence has delegated his or her powers, duties or functions and any other person duly authorized to act on behalf of that minister.

6.3.2 Warranty – Amendment to General Conditions 2010A

- A. Section 09, paragraph 1, of General Conditions 2010A, which forms part of the Contract will not apply to Work with a specified expiry date. The following paragraph replaces section 9, paragraph 1, General Conditions 2010A for Work with a specified expiry date:



- (i) Despite inspection and acceptance of the Work by or on behalf of Canada and without restricting any other provision of the Contract or any condition, warranty or provision implied or imposed by law, the Contractor warrants that the Work conforms to the specifications until the expiration date required by the Requirement. The Contractor must, upon the request of Canada, replace at its own expense including costs of returns and delivery of replacement Work as soon as possible any supplies that fail to conform or that deteriorates prior to the expiration date required by the Requirement.
- (ii) If full replacement is not available in a timeframe acceptable to Canada, then Canada may, in addition to and without prejudice to any other remedy available, choose from one of the following options for the quantity and Contract value of the Work affected:
 - a) Full and immediate reimbursement;
 - b) Equivalent full credit against future purchases under the Contract; or
 - c) Partial replacement and partial reimbursement or partial credit.

6.4 Term of Contract

6.4.1 Period of the Contract

- A. The period of the Contract is from date of Contract to 31 March 2025 inclusive.

6.4.2 Delivery Date

- A. The deliverables of the Initial Requirement must be received on or before 31 March 2022.
- B. Delivery for any optional Requirement must be within 14 weeks of a contract amendment.

6.4.3 Delivery Points

- A. Delivery of the requirement will be made to delivery point(s) specified at Annex A of the Contract.

6.6 Payment

6.6.1 Basis of Payment – Firm Price, Firm Unit Price(s) or Firm Lot Price(s)

- A. In consideration of the Contractor satisfactorily completing all of its obligations under the Contract, the Contractor will be paid a firm price as specified in Annex B – Basis of Payment. Customs duties are included and Applicable Taxes are extra.
- B. Canada will not pay the Contractor for any design changes, modifications or interpretations of the Work unless they have been approved, in writing, by the Contracting Authority before their incorporation into the Work.

6.6.2 Method of Payment – Multiple Payments

- A. Canada will pay the Contractor upon completion and delivery of units in accordance with the payment provisions of the Contract if:
 - (i) an accurate and complete invoice and any other documents required by the Contract have been submitted in accordance with the invoicing instructions provided in the Contract;



- (ii) all such documents have been verified by Canada;
- (iii) the Work delivered has been accepted by Canada.

6.6.3. Taxes – Foreign-based Contractor

- A. Unless specified otherwise in the Contract, the price includes no amount for any federal excise tax, state or local sales or use tax, or any other tax of a similar nature, or any Canadian tax whatsoever. The price, however, includes all other taxes. If the Work is normally subject to federal excise tax, Canada will, upon request, provide the Contractor a certificate of exemption from such federal excise tax in the form prescribed by the federal regulations.
- B. Canada will provide the Contractor evidence of export that may be requested by the tax authorities. If, as a result of Canada's failure to do so, the Contractor has to pay federal excise tax, Canada will reimburse the Contractor if the Contractor takes such steps as Canada may require to recover any payment made by the Contractor. The Contractor must refund to Canada any amount so recovered.

6.6.4 Electronic Payment of Invoices - Contract

6.8 Certifications and Additional Information

6.8.1 Compliance

- A. Unless specified otherwise, the continuous compliance with the certifications provided by the Contractor in its bid or precedent to contract award, and the ongoing cooperation in providing additional information are conditions of the Contract and failure to comply will constitute the Contractor in default. Certifications are subject to verification by Canada during the entire period of the Contract.

6.9 Applicable Laws

- A. The Contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Ontario, [for as specified by the bidder in its bid, if applicable].

6.10 Priority of Documents

- A. If there is a discrepancy between the wording of any documents that appear on the list, the wording of the document that first appears on the list has priority over the wording of any document that subsequently appears on the list:
 - (i) The Articles of Agreement;
 - (ii) The General Conditions 2010A (2020-05-28), General Conditions - Goods (Medium Complexity);
 - (iii) Annex A -Statement of Requirement;
 - (iv) Annex B -Basis of Payment; and

6.11 Defence Contract

- A. The Contract is a defence contract within the meaning of the *Defence Production Act*, R.S.C. 1985, c. D-1 (<http://laws-lois.justice.gc.ca/eng/acts/d-1/>), and must be governed accordingly.
- B. Title to the Work or to any materials, parts, work-in-process or finished work must belong to Canada free and clear of all claims, liens, attachments, charges or encumbrances. Canada is entitled, at any time, to remove, sell or dispose of the Work or any part of the Work in accordance with section 20 of the *Defence Production Act*.

6.12 Excess Goods

- A. The quantity of goods to be delivered by the Contractor is specified in the Contract. The Contractor remains liable for any shipment in excess of that quantity whether the excess quantity



is shipped voluntarily or as a result of an error by the Contractor. Canada will not make any payment to the Contractor for goods shipped in excess of the specified quantity. Canada will not return the said goods to the Contractor unless the Contractor agrees to pay for all the costs related to the return, including but not limited to administrative, shipping and handling costs. Canada will have the right to deduct such costs from any invoice submitted by the Contractor.

6.13 Product Recall or Withdrawal

- A. In the event of a recall or a withdrawal of Work, the Contractor must notify the Contracting Authority and must collect and destroy the delivered, recalled, or withdrawn Work at their own cost.
- B. The Contractor must, upon the request of Canada, replace as soon possible any recalled or withdrawn Work at their own cost.
- C. If full replacement is not available in a timeframe acceptable to Canada or, then Canada may, in addition to and without prejudice to any other remedy available, choose from one or the following options for the quantity and Contract value of the Work affected:
 - (i) Full and immediate reimbursement;
 - (ii) Equivalent full credit against future purchases under the Contract; or
 - (ii) Partial replacement and partial immediate reimbursement or partial credit under the Contract.

6.14 Labelling

- A. The Contractor must ensure that the manufacturer's and specification numbers appear on each item, either printed on the container or on an adhesive label of highest commercial standard affixed to the container.

6.15 Packaging

- A. Packaging for the work must clearly indicate on packaging slips and on the outside of outer packages and cartons, as applicable, the following:
 - (i) On each package and carton:
 - a. Drug Identification Number (DIN) and NATO Stock Number (NSN) (if applicable); and
 - b. Manufacturer's Brand Name.
 - (ii) On each package, carton, vial, ampoule, bottle, and pre-filled syringe (if applicable) the following:
 - a. Contractor's Name;
 - b. Global Trade Identification Number (GTIN) (if applicable);
 - c. Lot Number; and
 - d. Expiry Date.
 - (iii) Identify the carton(s) which contain the packaging slip. If the Contractor will use the GTIN, then Bar codes on shipping package (i.e. shrink wrapped product), secondary and primary package, including variable data, must comply with GS1 standards and the Canadian Automated identification of Vaccine Products process (if applicable);



- (iv) The Contractor must identify partly packed carton(s) and box(es);
- (v) Packaging is to be in accordance with good commercial standards to ensure safe arrival at destination. In addition to the Contract Requirement, the Contractor must ensure that all goods are properly labeled and packaged in compliance with the Biologics and Genetic Therapies Directorate (BGTD) Regulations; and
- (vi) Over the period of the Contract, the Contractor may offer other packaging options consistent with emerging technology. Canada retains the right to refuse such offerings.

6.16 Notice of Anticipated Shortage

- A. The Contractor must notify the Contracting Authority when it becomes aware of a potential problem, delay, or event that may lead to a shortage of any of the orders. Such notice must include a description of the nature of the problem or delay or event, the anticipated impact on the requirements of the Contract, the steps being taken by the Contractor to rectify the situation or to minimize the impact on this Contract, and the expected date by which the shortage will be fully corrected.
- B. For the purpose of this clause "shortage" is defined as the inability to meet an Order in full.

6.17 Inability to Supply

- A. In the event that the Contractor is unable to supply the Work in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Contract, whether as the result of drug discontinuation or for any other reason, the Contractor will provide a substitute product acceptable to Canada at a price no greater than firm unit price specified in Annex A.
- B. Should the Department of National Defence be required to purchase the Work from an alternate source at a higher price, the Contractor must reimburse the Department of National Defence for the difference between the price paid to the alternate source and the firm unit price specified in Annex A.
- C. Should the Department of National Defence be required to purchase the Work from an alternate source, Canada reserves the right to adjust the final total estimated quantity in the Contract.

6.18 Returns

- A. In addition to and without prejudice to any other remedy available, for work:
 - (i) Damaged during shipment from Contractor, the Contractor must provide full credit or replacement or refund for all returned Work where Contractor was contacted within 5 days of delivery to and acceptance by the Identified User. Damaged Work will be returned FCA Free Carrier (Identified user) Incoterms 2000 to the address specified below. The Contractor is responsible for shipping costs.

6.19 Maintenance of the Cold Chain During Transportation and the Use of Cold Chain Monitors.

- A. The Contractor must maintain the product:



- (i) at or between 15 to 25 degrees Celsius, or
 - (ii) as stated on the product label, or
 - (iii) in accordance with temperature conditions supported by stability data throughout transport from the Contractor to the Identified User (“Transport Conditions”). The Contractor must provide evidence to that effect from the data analysis of the temperature monitoring device or carrier logs, as applicable.
- B. The Contractor must use a continuous electronic monitoring device and a receiving notice specifying acceptance criteria must be included in the shipment. At the request of a Identified User, a color cold chain chemical indicator (heat and freeze) may be used.
- C. In the case of the use of a continuous electronic temperature-monitoring device, the Identified User will accept the Work on a conditional basis until a Certificate of Conformity is received. The Contractor must provide a Certificate of Conformity to the Identified User within three (3) business days of the Contractor's receipt of the monitoring device or the device's data in the case of an electronic information transfer. Unless the monitoring device is disposable, the Identified User will return all electronic monitoring devices to the Contractor within 24 hours of receiving the Work.
- D. A written “Certification of Conformity” confirms that:
- (i) the required Transport Conditions were maintained during transport;
 - (ii) the integrity and quality of the product has not been affected by temperature excursions during transport, and
 - (iii) the integrity and quality of the product has not been affected by temperature excursions during transport, and
- E. The Contractor must maintain a record of the shipment and transport data when using an electronic monitoring device for the purpose of addressing any future enquiries from the Identified User. The Contractor must keep these records, as a minimum, until 12 months after the expiry date of the Work, as indicated on the drug product packaging label or 12 months following the end of the period of the Contract, whichever is the later.
- F. Failure of the Contractor to provide a Certificate of Conformity within this timeframe will entitle the Identified User to return the product to the Contractor for full replacement at no additional cost to the Identified User.
- G. Acceptance by an Identified User of a shipment not meeting the Transport Conditions is not a waiver of Transport Conditions for future shipments experiencing similar Transport Conditions either by the Identified User in question or by other Identified Users.
- H. During the evaluation of the Transport Conditions by the Contractor, the Identified User will ensure that the Work is maintained according to the storage recommendations stated in the product monograph

One (1) of the following two (2) options will be inserted in the resulting contract, as applicable:

Option 1: A2000C (2006-06-16) when the contract is to be with a Canadian-based supplier; or
6.20 Foreign Nationals (Canadian Contractor)



- A. The Contractor must comply with Canadian immigration requirements applicable to foreign nationals entering Canada to work temporarily in fulfillment of the Contract. If the Contractor wishes to hire a foreign national to work in Canada to fulfill the Contract, the Contractor should immediately contact the nearest Service Canada regional office to enquire about Citizenship and Immigration Canada's requirements to issue a temporary work permit to a foreign national. The Contractor is responsible for all costs incurred as a result of non-compliance with immigration requirements.

Option 2: **A2001C** (2006-06-16) when the contract is to be with a foreign-based supplier.

6.20 Foreign Nationals (Foreign Contractor)

- A. The Contractor must comply with Canadian immigration legislation applicable to foreign nationals entering Canada to work temporarily in fulfillment of the Contract. If the Contractor wishes to hire a foreign national to work in Canada to fulfill the Contract, the Contractor should immediately contact the nearest Canadian Embassy, Consulate or High Commission in the Contractor's country to obtain instructions, information on Citizenship and Immigration Canada's requirements and any required documents. The Contractor is responsible to ensure that foreign nationals have the required information, documents and authorizations before performing any work under the Contract in Canada. The Contractor is responsible for all costs incurred as a result of non-compliance with immigration requirements.

6.21 Insurance – No Specific Requirement

- A. The Contractor is responsible for deciding if insurance coverage is necessary to fulfill its obligation under the Contract and to ensure compliance with any applicable law. Any insurance acquired or maintained by the Contractor is at its own expense and for its own benefit and protection. It does not release the Contractor from or reduce its liability under the Contract.

6.22 Canada's Special Access Program

- A. As required by Health Canada's Special Access Program in order to facilitate importation/shipment, the Contractor must include the following label on the shipping container: "URGENT-EMERGENCY", and must include a copy of the following document:
- Letter of Authorization Issued by Health Canada's Special Access Program.
- B. For Schedule II narcotics under the United States Controlled Substances Act (DEA Number 9801), and for Schedule I controlled drugs as per Canada's Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (1996, c. 19), Part VII, Schedule I, Section 16: "Fentanyl, their salts, derivatives, and analogues and salts of derivatives and analogues..." the shipment must also include copies of the following documents:
- Export Permit issued by the United States Drug Enforcement Agency; and
 - Import Permit issued by Health Canada's Office of Controlled Substances.

6.23 Dispute Resolution

- A. The parties agree to maintain open and honest communication about the Work throughout and after the performance of the contract.
- B. The parties agree to consult and co-operate with each other in the furtherance of the contract and promptly notify the other party or parties and attempt to resolve problems or differences that may arise.



- C. If the parties cannot resolve a dispute through consultation and cooperation, the parties agree to consult a neutral third party offering alternative dispute resolution services to attempt to address the dispute.
- D. Options of alternative dispute resolution services can be found on Canada's Buy and Sell website under the heading "[Dispute Resolution](#)".

6.24 Shipping Instruction (DND) – Delivered at Place (DAP) Incoterm 2010

- A. Goods must be consigned to the destination specified in the Contract and delivered:
- (i) Delivered at Place (DAP) Petawawa, Ontario, Incoterms 2000 for shipments from a commercial contractor.
 - (ii) The Contractor is responsible for export clearance, delivery charges, administration, costs and risks of transport. Canada is responsible for all import clearance, including the payment of applicable duties and taxes.

6.25 Transportation Costs

- A. The Contractor must ship the goods prepaid including all delivery charges to Petawawa, Ontario. Prepaid transportation costs must be shown as a separate item on the invoice, supported by a certified copy of the prepaid transportation bill of lading.

6.26 Canadian Customs Documentation

A. General

1. The Contractor must provide two (2) copies of the Canada Customs Invoice (CCI) or two (2) copies of the commercial invoice marked "For Customs Purposes Only".
2. Shipments from the United States and Mexico that are of American, Mexican or Canadian origin, as defined by the *Canada-United States-Mexico Agreement* (CUSMA):
 - a) For goods valued at more than USD\$1,000, the Contractor must provide a certification of origin of the goods that demonstrate that the good is originating. This may be provided on the commercial invoice or any other document and does not need to follow a prescribed format, but must:
 - (i) Describe the originating good in sufficient detail to enable its identification;
 - (ii) Meet the requirements as set out in the [Uniform Regulations for Rules of Origin](#); and
 - (iii) Contain a set of minimum data elements as described in Annex 5-A ([Chapter 5](#) of CUSMA) that indicate that the good is both originating and meets the requirements of Chapter 5.
 - b) For goods valued at USD\$1,000 or less, the proof must be a statement on the invoice certifying that the good qualifies as an originating good.

In either case, an original signature and a reference to the contract number must be included in the document. For contracts valued at C\$250,000 or more, the certification of origin will not be required. If applicable, the exchange rate to be used to determine the value of goods



in USD is the exchange rate on the Direct Shipment Date, which is the date the shipment starts its direct journey to the Buyer.

3. For shipments from Israel that are Israeli in origin, as defined by the Canada-Israel Free Trade Agreement (CIFTA), the Contractor must provide the certification of origin of the goods. This proof must be in the form of a CIFTA Certificate of Origin for goods valued at more than C\$1,600, or for goods valued at C\$1,600 or less, a statement on the invoice certifying that the good qualifies as an originating good. In either case, an original signature and a reference to the contract number must be included in the document. For contracts valued at C\$250,000 or more, the proof of origin will not be required.
4. The Contractor must not employ commercial customs brokers to custom clear the goods provided under the Contract, unless authorized by the Canadian Material Support Group / Customs, at National Defence Headquarters, telephone: 1-855-210-5149, facsimile: 1-800-306-1811 or 613-971-7333.

B. Completion of Documents

The CCI or commercial invoice must include the following information:

- a) complete description of the goods being shipped, including the applicable United States "Schedule B" codes or United States Harmonized Tariff Schedule codes;
- b) value and terms of sale for each item (e.g. sale, loan, warranty, Incoterms 2000), including value of repairs, warranty repairs or replacement costs;
- c) the Contract number and financial codes (use Field 3 on the CCI form);
- d) country of origin of goods; and
- e) one of the following:
 - (i) when a CUSMA Certification of Origin/CIFTA Certificate of Origin has been prepared, a statement in the "Description" field of the CCI or commercial invoice confirming that the CUSMA Certification of Origin/CIFTA Certificate of Origin has been completed and is attached to the CCI or commercial invoice; or
 - (ii) when a CUSMA Certification of Origin/CIFTA Certificate of Origin was not required, a statement in the "Description" field of the CCI or commercial invoice certifying that the good qualifies as an originating good.

C. Distribution of Documents

1. The Contractor must attach one (1) copy of the CCI or one (1) copy of the commercial invoice, as applicable, to shipping container No. 1 of all shipments using a waterproof envelope marked "Canada Customs Documentation".
2. The second copy of each of the above-mentioned forms must be attached to the shipping documents.
3. A copy of the CIFTA Certificate of Origin must be faxed to 1-800-306-1811 or emailed to DNDCustoms-MDNDouanes@forces.gc.ca.



6.27 Delivery of Dangerous Goods/Hazardous Products

- A. The Contractor must mark dangerous goods/hazardous products which are classed as dangerous/hazardous as follows:
- (i) shipping container - in accordance with the [Transportation of Dangerous Goods Act](#), 1992, c. 34; and
 - (ii) immediate product container - in accordance with the [Hazardous Products Act](#), R.S., 1985, c. H-3.
- B. The Contractor must provide bilingual Safety Data Sheets, indicating the NATO Stock Number as follows:

- C. The Contractor will be responsible for any damages caused by improper packaging, labelling or carriage of dangerous goods/hazardous products.
- D. The Contractor must ensure they adhere to all levels of regulations regarding dangerous goods/hazardous products as set forth by federal, provincial and municipal laws and by-laws.
- E. The Contractor must contact the consignee (i.e. Supply Depot Traffic Section) at least 48 hours before shipping dangerous goods/hazardous products in order to schedule a receiving time.

6.28 Dangerous Goods/Hazardous Products – Labelling and Packaging Compliance

- A. The Contractor must ensure proper labelling and packaging in the supply and shipping of dangerous goods/hazardous products to the Government of Canada.
- B. The Contractor will be held liable for any damages caused by improper packaging, labelling or carriage of dangerous goods/hazardous products.

The SAP application will be filed by CF H Svcs Gp.
- 4.2 The Contractor must provide evidence that the product has been manufactured in compliance with current Good Manufacturing Practices (cGMP) as set out in the International Conference on Harmonisation of Technical Requirements for Registration of Pharmaceuticals for Human Use Good Manufacturing Practice Guide for Active Pharmaceutical Ingredients Q7, – (<https://database.ich.org/sites/default/files/Q7%20Guideline.pdf>). The evidence provided should include, but is not limited to:
