PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Introduction

The bid solicitation is divided into seven parts plus attachments and annexes, as follows:

- Part 1 General Information: provides a general description of the requirement;
- Part 2 Bidder Instructions: provides the instructions, clauses and conditions applicable to the bid solicitation;
- Part 3 Bid Preparation Instructions: provides Bidders with instructions on how to prepare their bid;
- **Part 4** Evaluation Procedures and Basis of Selection: indicates how the evaluation will be conducted, the evaluation criteria that must be addressed in the bid, and the basis of selection;
- **Part 5** Certifications and Additional Information: includes the certifications and additional information to be provided;
- Part 6 Security and Other Requirements: includes specific requirements that must be addressed by Bidders; and
- Part 7 Resulting Contract Clauses: includes the clauses and conditions that will apply to any resulting contract.

The Annexes include the Statement of Work, the Basis of Payment and any other annexes and attachments.

The Appendixes include the Evaluation Criteria and the Financial Proposal Form.

1.2 Summary

By means of the RFP, Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) is seeking proposals from bidders to perform comprehensive ore sortability studies on up to eight (8) ore samples from Canadian critical minerals projects (REE, lithium or others), to determine the feasibility of sensor-based sorting and provide design information for sorting systems on an as and when required basis.

The resulting contract will be from date of award to March 31, 2024 with the option to extend the contract for three (3) Option years.

1.2.1 This bid solicitation allows bidders to use the epost Connect service provided by Canada Post Corporation to transmit their bid electronically. Bidders must refer to Part 2 entitled Bidder Instructions, and Part 3 entitled Bid Preparation Instructions, of the bid solicitation, for further information.

1.3 Debriefings

Bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days from receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing will be done in writing, by email.

2.2 Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted only to the Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) Bid Receiving Unit specified below by the date and time indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation.

Only bids submitted using epost Connect service will be accepted.

NRCan will not assume responsibility for proposals directed to any other location.

The onus is on the Bidder to ensure that the bid is submitted correctly using epost Connect service. Not complying with the instructions may result in NRCan's inability to ascertain reception date and/or to consider the bid prior to contract award. Therefore, NRCan reserves the right to reject any proposal not complying with these instructions.

Due to the nature of the bid solicitation, bids transmitted by mail or facsimile to NRCan will not be accepted.

2.3 Enquiries - Bid Solicitation

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than five (5) calendar days before the bid closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

2.4 Applicable Laws

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Ontario.

Bidders may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Bidders.

2.5 Improvement of Requirement During Solicitation Period

Should bidders consider that the specifications or Statement of Work contained in the bid solicitation could be improved technically or technologically, bidders are invited to make suggestions, in writing, to the Contracting Authority named in the bid solicitation. Bidders must clearly outline the suggested improvement as well as the reason for the suggestion. Suggestions that do not restrict the level of competition nor favour a particular bidder will be given consideration provided they are submitted to the Contracting Authority at least five (5) days before the bid closing date. Canada will have the right to accept or reject any or all suggestions.

2.6 Basis for Canada's Ownership of Intellectual Property

PART 3 - BID PREPARATION INSTRUCTIONS

3.1 Bid Preparation Instructions

Canada requests that Bidders provide their bid in separately bound sections as follows:

Section III: Certifications (1 electronic copy)

Section IV: Additional Information (one (1) electronic copy)

Prices should appear in the financial bid only. No prices should be indicated in any other section of the bid.

Canada requests that Bidders follow the format instructions described below in the preparation of their bid:

- (a) use 8.5 x 11 inch (216 mm x 279 mm) format;
- (b) use a numbering system that corresponds to the bid solicitation.

Section I: Technical Bid

In their technical bid, Bidders should demonstrate their understanding of the requirements contained in the bid solicitation and explain how they will meet these requirements. Bidders should demonstrate their capability and describe their approach in a thorough, concise and clear manner for carrying out the work.

The technical bid should address clearly and in sufficient depth the points that are subject to the evaluation criteria against which the bid will be evaluated. Simply repeating the statement contained in the bid solicitation is not sufficient. In order to facilitate the evaluation of the bid, Canada requests that Bidders address and present topics in the order of the evaluation criteria under the same headings. To avoid duplication, Bidders may refer to different sections of their bids by identifying the specific paragraph and page number where the subject topic has already been addressed.

Section II: Financial Bid

Bidders must submit their financial bid in accordance with the Financial Proposal Form in Appendix 2. The total amount of Applicable Taxes must be shown separately.

Section III: Certifications

Bidders must submit the certifications and additional information required under Part 5.

In Section IV of their bid, bidders should provide:

- 1. the 1st page of this RFP signed with their legal name;
- 2. the name of the contact person (provide also this person's mailing address, phone numbers and email address) authorized by the Bidder to enter into communications with Canada with regards to their bid, and any contract that may result from their bid.

PART 4 - EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND BASIS OF SELECTION

4.1 Evaluation Procedures

- (a) Bids will be assessed in accordance with the entire requirement of the bid solicitation including the Technical and financial evaluation criteria.
- (b) An evaluation team composed of representatives of Canada will evaluate the bids.

4.1.1 Technical Evaluation

Mandatory and point rated technical evaluation criteria are included in Appendix 1 - Evaluation Criteria.

4.2 Basis of Selection

4.2.1 Highest Combined Rating of Technical Merit and Price

- 1. To be declared responsive, a bid must:
 - a) comply with all the requirements of the bid solicitation; and
 - b) meet all mandatory criteria; and
 - c) obtain the required minimum of 43 points overall for the technical evaluation criteria which are subject to point rating. The rating is performed on a scale of 72 points.
- 2. Bids not meeting (a) or (b) or (c) will be declared non-responsive.
- 3. The selection will be based on the highest responsive combined rating of technical merit and price. The ratio will be 70% for the technical merit and 30% for the price.
- 4. To establish the technical merit score, the overall technical score for each responsive bid will be determined as follows: total number of points obtained / maximum number of points available multiplied by the ratio of 70%.
- 5. To establish the pricing score, each responsive bid will be prorated against the lowest evaluated price and the ratio of 30%.
- 6. For each responsive bid, the technical merit score and the pricing score will be added to determine its combined rating.
- 7. Neither the responsive bid obtaining the highest technical score nor the one with the lowest evaluated price will necessarily be accepted. The responsive bid with the highest combined rating of technical merit and price will be recommended for award of a contract.

The table below illustrates an example where all three bids are responsive and the selection of the contractor is determined by a 70/30 ratio of technical merit and price, respectively. The total available points equal 135 and the lowest evaluated price is \$45,000 (45).

PART 5 - CERTIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Bidders must provide the required certifications and additional information to be awarded a contract.

The certifications provided by Bidders to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Unless specified otherwise, Canada will declare a bid non-responsive, or will declare a contractor in default if any certification made by the Bidder is found to be untrue, whether made knowingly or unknowingly, during the bid evaluation period or during the contract period.

The Contracting Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Bidder's certifications. Failure to comply and to cooperate with any request or requirement imposed by the Contracting Authority will render the bid non-responsive or constitute a default under the Contract.

5.1 Certifications Required with the Bid

Bidders must submit the following duly completed certifications as part of their bid.

5.2.2 Federal Contractors Program for Employment Equity - Bid Certification

The Bidder certifies that, should it be awarded a contract as a result of the bid solicitation, every individual proposed in its bid will be available to perform the Work as required by Canada's representatives and at the time specified in the bid solicitation or agreed to with Canada's representatives. If for reasons beyond its control, the Bidder is unable to provide the services of an individual named in its bid, the Bidder may propose a substitute with similar



qualifications and experience. The Bidder must advise the Contracting Authority of the reason for the substitution and provide the name, qualifications and experience of the proposed replacement. For the purposes of this clause, only the following reasons will be considered as beyond the control of the Bidder: death, sickness, maternity and parental leave, retirement, resignation, dismissal for cause or termination of an agreement for default.

Mediation

Arbitration

Sensor-based ore sorting for the pre-concentration of critical mineral samples

SW2 Background

The Government of Canada has developed a list of 31 minerals considered critical for the sustainable economic success of Canada and our allies (NRCan, 2021). Canada can leverage its mining and processing expertise and world-leading environmental, social and governance credentials, and become the global supplier of choice for clean and advanced technologies to support the transition to a low emissions economy. CanmetMINING is undertaking a significant effort in the research and development of critical minerals, such as rare earth elements (REE), nickel, cobalt, vanadium, graphite and lithium, in order to help advance Canadian mining projects to production and maximize Canadian value and benefits.

A review pertaining to coarse ore pre-concentration on REE minerals, completed in 2016, concluded that pre-concentration by ore sorting or dense media separation has the potential to offer significant economic advantages for various Canadian REE production scenarios (J.R. Goode and Associates, 2016). Consequently, three representative Canadian REE ore samples were subjected to sensor-based ore sorting testing, to better inform their suitability for pre-concentration. The study provided a systematic understanding of the response of specific sensors to the properties of various mineral assemblages at the single fragment scale. Since REE are hosted in a wide variety of minerals and are often presented in complex textural relationships with associated phases (e.g. gangue minerals), such detailed studies enabled a comprehensive description of the various factors that affected the signal output and the resulting performance of various sensors.

This initial sensor-based ore study on three REE ore samples found that some materials respond very positively, with results indicating improved rejection of barren rocks from ores, improved processing feed grade and ore characteristics. Therefore, it is of interest to test other critical minerals to determine their suitability for using sensor-based ore sorting as a pre-concentration method.

SW3 Context and Objectives

To perform comprehensive ore sortability studies on up to eight (8) ore samples from Canadian critical minerals projects (REE, lithium or others), to determine the feasibility of sensor-based sorting and provide design information for sorting systems on an as and when required basis. Optional years may include up to an additional six (6) ore samples.

SW4 Project Requirements



SW4.1 Tasks, Deliverables, Milestones and Schedule

Working in close collaborations with CanmetMINING researchers and the Canadian companies that are developing various REE, lithium and other critical mineral projects in Canada, the successful bidder (contractor) will perform comprehensive ore sortability studies.

For each ore sample, the contractor will, in consultation with the respective company's exploration/mining geologists, lead in identifying and suggesting the selection of suitable ore fragments appropriate for preconcentration. The ore fragments' variations in properties such as mineralogy, mineral associations, mineral chemistry, liberation, veins, fractures, grain sizes, grade etc. should be carefully considered during the selection process. Mineralogical reports might be provided to assist the contractor in their understanding of the mineral projects, if available.

The number of mineralized and barren rocks (trench samples or drill cores) selected for testing, the sampling procedure, and the number of size fractions to test will also be determined jointly between the contractor, CanmetMINING and the company. Depending on the intention of the company and the number of size fractions selected for testing, ore sorting will be performed using one of the following two scopes, on an as and when required basis:

Scope 1: For projects where ore sorting will be performed on one (1) size fraction, the contractor will:

Arrange for shipment of the ore fragments from their location of origin (in Canada) to the contractor's testing facility. For budgeting purpose, approximately 100 pieces of ore fragments will be made available. The contractor will cover the shipping cost of this initial sample shipment. Additional ore or barren fragments could be provided to the contractor, upon request and if available.

Receive and label the ore fragments. Prepare and subject the fragments to detailed batch testing using a suite of sensors. A minimum of three (3) sensors should be tested for each sample. The sensors to test could include but not limited to: XRF (x-ray fluorescence), XRT (x-ray transmission), HS (hyperspectral reflectance spectrometry), and LIB (laser-induced breakdown spectrometry).

Obtain chemical analysis on the required samples. All analyses on samples must be conducted in a consistent manner at one ISO accredited analytical facility. Due to the intricacies of analyzing for REE, the digestion on REE samples must be performed using either lithium metaborate fusion or sodium peroxide fusion technique.

Note that the contractor <u>will be covering</u> the cost of the chemical analysis. The turnaround time of the assays (usually 3 weeks) should be considered in the schedule of the proposed workplan.

Perform evaluations of the response from the sensors tested, as it corresponds to the ore fragments' properties and assays.

Provide a written report that summarizes all the results and findings obtained from the test program. The report should also discuss the recommendations and implications for future sorting analyses, and the feasibility for implementation.

Scope 2: For projects where ore sorting will be performed on multiple size fractions, the contractor will:

Arrange for shipment of the ore samples from their location of origin (in Canada) to the contractor's testing facility. For budgeting purposes, 300 kg of samples will be made available. The contractor <u>will cover</u> the shipping cost of this initial sample shipment. Additional ore or barren fragments could be provided to the contractor, upon request and if available.

Receive and screen the ore samples into the various size fractions. Prepare and subject each fraction to detailed batch testing using a suite of sensors. A minimum of three (3) sensors should be tested for each sample. The sensors to test could include but not limited to: XRF (x-ray fluorescence), XRT (x-ray transmission), HS (hyperspectral reflectance spectrometry), and LIB (laser-induced breakdown spectrometry).

Obtain chemical analysis on the required samples. All analyses on samples must be conducted in a consistent manner at one ISO accredited analytical facility. Due to the intricacies of analyzing for REE, the digestion on REE samples must be performed using either lithium metaborate fusion or sodium peroxide fusion technique.

Note that the contractor <u>will be covering</u> the cost of the chemical analysis. The turnaround time of the assays (usually 3 weeks) should be considered in the schedule of the proposed workplan.

Perform size-by-size evaluations of the response from the sensors tested, as it corresponds to the ore samples' properties and assays.

Provide a written report that summarizes all the results and findings obtained from the test program. The report should also discuss the recommendations and implications for future sorting analyses, and the feasibility for implementation.

Deliverable 1: An initial meeting within ten (10) working days of signing the contract. The date, type (telephone, video-conference) of the meeting will be decided jointly between NRCan, the respective companies providing the ore samples, and the supplier. The objective of the meeting is to discuss the proposal, in general, and to clarify the schedule and the work breakdown table.

The Contractor must provide one electronic copy of the draft report, which must contain all the study findings as per the Statement of Work, within five (5) months from the initial meeting and receipt of ore samples. Natural Resources Canada will review and provide comments to the Contractor within ten (10) working days after receiving the draft report.

Deliverable 4: Final Report. Submission of the final report (in English), which must address all changes/comments provided by NRCan in Deliverable 5. One electronic copy must be received by NRCan, within two (2) weeks after receiving the comments on the draft report.




