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## **PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION**

### **1.1 Introduction**

The requirement is detailed under Annex "A" of the resulting contract clauses.

### **1.2 Debriefings**

Bidders may request a debriefing on the results of the bid solicitation process. Bidders should make the request to the Contracting Authority within 15 working days from receipt of the results of the bid solicitation process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.

### **1.3 Epost Connect Service**

This bid solicitation allows bidders to use the epost connect service provided by Canada Post Corporation to transmit their bid electronically. Bidders must refer to Part 2 entitled Bidder Instructions, and Part 3 entitled Bid Preparation Instructions, of the bid solicitation, for further information.

## **PART 2 - BIDDER INSTRUCTIONS**

### **2.1 Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions**

### **2.3 Enquiries - Bid Solicitation**

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Contracting Authority no later than five (5) calendar days before the bid closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Bidders should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the bid solicitation to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

### **2.4 Applicable Laws**

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Newfoundland and Labrador.

Bidders may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their bid, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Bidders.

### **2.5 Bid Challenge and Recourse Mechanisms**

- (a) Several mechanisms are available to potential suppliers to challenge aspects of the procurement process up to and including contract award.

- If the Bidder is simultaneously providing copies of its bid using multiple acceptable delivery methods, and if there is a discrepancy between the wording of any of these copies and the electronic copy provided through CPC Connect service, the wording of the electronic copy provided through CPC Connect service will have priority over the wording of the other copies.

Prices must appear in the financial bid only. No prices must be indicated in any other section of the bid.

Canada requests that bidders follow the format instructions described below in the preparation of hard copy of their bid:

- (b) use a numbering system that corresponds to the bid solicitation.

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## ANNEX "A"

### STATEMENT OF REQUIREMENT

**Title:** Procurement of marine winch for offshore marine monitoring activities

#### 1.0 Objectives

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) is seeking to purchase a marine winch capable of deploying marine monitoring equipment (i.e. deep sea cameras, water sampling equipment) of moderate weight to large depths (Max 3000 m).

#### 2.0 Winch Requirements

The winch must be marine grade with a load capability requirement of 455 kg and a capacity for 3000 m of rope. Operations will take place on a 65 ft or larger vessel (minimal size constraints) and will be used in temperatures ranging from -10 °C to 30 °C.

The winch must be able to withstand sea spray. Thus, it is suggested that materials be made from marine Aluminum (i.e. Aluminum 6061-T6), powder-coated for further protection from the elements. Steel parts may be sandblasted and coated with 3 layers of marine paint.

The line speed at the core should be 0 to ~16.3 m/min while the line speed at the drum should be between 0 to ~36 m/min. However, it is prefer that the system move as fast as safely possible in order to save time upon retrieval at greater depths.

#### Must include:

1. Slip clutch [or alternative; i.e. shear pin]
2. Electric Brake
3. Brake hold required
4. Stainless steel
5. Top mounted utility winch for deck recovery of tow frame
6. Mechanical drivetrain should be closed for safety and capable of withstanding sea spray as it will be fastened on deck.
7. Vertical pull for lowering equipment to the ocean bottom
8. EWC-6 + magnet-encoded sheave (for monitoring deployed cable length)
9. Level wind
10. Sprocket assisted manual backup

#### 2.1. Power source

##### *Vessel power:*

The first vessel has a 120/240V AC phase 1 Cummins Diesel marine generator (model num: MDKBN-5960887). The second vessel has a 220V AC phase 1 power source (**type and model number unknown**).

*Power cables:*

The power cable to the winch needs to be at least 12 m while the cable to the joystick from the winch needs to be at least 6 m. The joystick must be a spring-return joystick that plugs into and disables the winch controller.

*2.2 Winch rope*

The winch will use 3000 m of 1/4" (6 mm) dyneema rope (soft, polyethylene, no conductors). This will solve all the issues of bend, drum size etc.

The specs from the rope supplier stated the minimum break load is 4.2 tonnes (9240 lbs), less 10% for splicing [ $9240 \times 0.9 = 8316$  lbs, and  $8316/4 = 2079$  pounds work load limit] with factor of safety 4:1. Additionally, they provided this info: 6mm diameter rope – minimum diameter > 60mm sheave, optimal diameter 120 mm plus sheave.

The minimum bend radius is 20 times the ropes diameter, the weight-per length of the cable in air is 2.3 kg/100m and in water is N/A (it floats). It is also waterproof and wear resistant.

### **3.0 Scope of work**

*3.1 Camera operations:*

When the drop camera is in use, the vessel will be travelling at approximately 1 knot. The camera will be operated in a “yo-yo” pattern (~1m vertical movement). This means there will be fine vertical adjustments made to lift the camera and drop it back to the ocean floor as the vessel moves (requirement of fine-adjustment joystick). Maximum depth for this system will be roughly 3000 m, but will likely be used in water depths of approximately 1500 m. The whole baited camera system (frame, camera, batteries) weighs approximately 250 Kg in air.

*3.2 Rosette operations:*

When the rosette is in use, the vessel will not be in gear. Thus, movement of the vessel will strictly be due to current and wind, which should not exceed more than 2 knots. This system will be lowered to depth (Max 3000 m) and then recovered. During deployment, the system collects water samples, subsequently increasing the load upon retrieval. Without water, this system weighs 60 Kg in air. The system, with water included, weighs 84 Kg in air.
