## 1. Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the bid solicitation by number, date and title are set out in the <u>Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions Manual</u> issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

Bidders who submit a bid agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the bid solicitation and accept the clauses and conditions of the resulting contract.

- a. Unless specified otherwise in the solicitation, Bidders must submit their bid to the CSC bid submission email address indicated on page 1 of the bid solicitation document. This email address is the only acceptable email address for Bidders to submit their bid in response to this bid solicitation.
- b. Bidders may transmit their bid at any time prior to the solicitation closing date and time.

- c. Bidders should include the bid solicitation number in the subject field of their email.
- d. Canada will not be responsible for any failure attributable to the transmission or receipt of the bid by email including, but not limited to, the following:
  - i. Receipt of a garbled, corrupted or incomplete bid;
  - ii. Availability or condition of the email service;
  - iii. Incompatibility between the sending and receiving equipment;
  - iv. Delay in transmission or receipt of the bid;
  - v. Failure of the Bidder to properly identify the bid;
  - vi. Illegibility of the bid;
  - vii. Security of bid data;
  - viii. Failure of the Bidder to send the bid to the correct email address:
  - ix. Connectivity issues; or
  - x. Email attachments that are blocked or not received even though the Bidder's email has been successfully delivered.
- e. CSC will send an acknowledgement of receipt of the Bidder's email by email from the email address provided for the submission of bids. This acknowledgement will confirm only the receipt of the Bidder's email and will not confirm if all of the Bidder's email attachments have been received, may be opened nor if their contents are readable. CSC will not respond to follow-up emails from Bidders requesting confirmation of attachments.
- f. Bidders must ensure they are using the correct email address for bid submission and should not rely on the accuracy of copying and pasting the email address from the solicitation document cover page.
- g. A bid transmitted by a Bidder to the CSC submission email address constitutes the Bidder's formal bid, and must be submitted in accordance with section 05 of 2003, Standard Instructions – Goods or Services – Competitive Requirements.
- h. Bidders are to note that CSC's email system has a limit of 10 MB per single email message. CSC's email system will reject emails with the following attachments: batch files, executable files, and image files in the following formats: JPEG, GIF, TIFF. Canada will not accept encrypted emails or emails that include attachments with passwords.

Section 09 Customs clearance of 2003, Standard Instructions - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, is deleted in its entirety.

CSC recommends that bidders submit their response to the requirements of this solicitation in typewritten format.

Bidders must ensure that any handwritten information included in their bid is clearly legible in order to allow CSC to complete the bid evaluation. CSC reserves the right, at its sole and entire discretion, to disregard any handwritten information which it determines to be illegible when assessing whether bids comply with all of the requirements of the bid solicitation including, if applicable, any and all evaluation criteria.

#### 3. Former Public Servants

Contracts awarded to former public servants (FPS) in receipt of a pension or of a lump sum payment must bear the closest public scrutiny, and reflect fairness in the spending of public funds. In order to comply with Treasury Board policies and directives on contracts awarded to FPSs, bidders must provide the information required below before contract award. If the answer to the questions and, as applicable the information required have not been received by the time the evaluation of bids is completed, Canada will inform the Bidder of a time frame within which to

"lump sum payment period" means the period measured in weeks of salary, for which payment has been made to facilitate the transition to retirement or to other employment as a result of the implementation of various programs to reduce the size of the Public Service. The lump sum payment period does not include the period of severance pay, which is measured in a like manner.

"pension" means a pension or annual allowance paid under the <u>Public Service Superannuation Act</u> (PSSA), R.S., 1985, c. P-36, and any increases paid pursuant to the <u>Supplementary Retirement Benefits Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. S-24 as it affects the PSSA. It does not include pensions payable pursuant to the <u>Canadian Forces Superannuation Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. C-17, the <u>Defence Services Pension Continuation Act</u>, 1970, c. D-3, the <u>Royal Canadian Mounted Police Pension Continuation Act</u>, 1970, c. R-10, and the <u>Royal Canadian Mounted Police Superannuation Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. R-11, the <u>Members of Parliament Retiring Allowances Act</u>, R.S. 1985, c. M-5, and that portion of pension payable to the <u>Canada Pension Plan Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. C-8.

Care should be taken by bidders to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that the Bidder do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated, and the enquiry can be answered to all Bidders. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Bidders may not be answered by Canada.

#### 5. Applicable Laws

Any resulting contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Manitoba.



- The Contractor must submit invoices in accordance with the section entitled "Invoice Submission" of the general conditions. Invoices cannot be submitted until all work identified in the invoice is completed. Each invoice must be supported by:
  - a. a copy of time sheets to support the time claimed;
  - b. current price list for all baiting products; finance has to be able to verify the pricing we are being invoiced for is correct
- 2. Invoices must be distributed as follows:



 One (1) copy must be forwarded to the Project Authority identified under the section entitled "Authorities" of the Contract.

#### 8. Certifications and Additional Information

## 8.1 Compliance

Unless specified otherwise, the continuous compliance with the certifications provided by the Contractor in its bid or precedent to contract award, and the ongoing cooperation in providing additional information are conditions of the Contract and failure to comply will constitute the Contractor in default. Certifications are subject to verification by Canada during the entire period of the Contract.

## 9. Applicable Laws

The Contract must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in Manitoba.

## 10. Priority of Documents

If there is a discrepancy between the wording of any documents that appear on the list, the wording of the document that first appears on the list has priority over the wording of any document that subsequently appears on the list.

- (a) the Articles of Agreement;
- (b) the General Conditions 2010C (2022-01-28), General Conditions-Services (Medium Complexity)


#### 11. Insurance - Specific Requirements

The Contractor must comply with the insurance requirements specified below. The Contractor must maintain the required insurance coverage for the duration of the Contract. Compliance with the insurance requirements does not release the Contractor from or reduce its liability under the Contract.

The Contractor is responsible for deciding if additional insurance coverage is necessary to fulfill its obligation under the Contract and to ensure compliance with any applicable law. Any additional insurance coverage is at the Contractor's expense, and for its own benefit and protection. The Contractor must forward to the Contracting Authority within ten (10) days after the date of award of the Contract, a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the insurance coverage and confirming that the insurance policy complying with the requirements is in force. Coverage must be placed with an Insurer licensed to carry out business in Canada. The Contractor must, if requested by the Contracting Authority, forward to Canada a certified true copy of all applicable insurance policies.

- 1. The Contractor must obtain Commercial General Liability Insurance, and maintain it in force throughout the duration of the Contract, in an amount usual for a contract of this nature, but for not less than \$2,000,000 per accident or occurrence and in the annual aggregate.
- 2. The Commercial General Liability policy must include the following:

- a. Additional Insured: Canada is added as an additional insured, but only with respect to liability arising out of the Contractor's performance of the Contract. The interest of Canada should read as follows: Canada, as represented by Public Works and Government Services Canada.
- Bodily Injury and Property Damage to third parties arising out of the operations of the Contractor.
- c. Products and Completed Operations: Coverage for bodily injury or property damage arising out of goods or products manufactured, sold, handled, or distributed by the Contractor and/or arising out of operations that have been completed by the Contractor.
- d. Personal Injury: While not limited to, the coverage must include Violation of Privacy, Libel and Slander, False Arrest, Detention or Imprisonment and Defamation of Character.
- e. Cross Liability/Separation of Insureds: Without increasing the limit of liability, the policy must protect all insured parties to the full extent of coverage provided. Further, the policy must apply to each Insured in the same manner and to the same extent as if a separate policy had been issued to each.
- f. Blanket Contractual Liability: The policy must, on a blanket basis or by specific reference to the Contract, extend to assumed liabilities with respect to contractual provisions.
- g. Employees and, if applicable, Volunteers must be included as Additional Insured.
- h. Employers' Liability (or confirmation that all employees are covered by Worker's compensation (WSIB) or similar program)
- Broad Form Property Damage including Completed Operations: Expands the Property Damage coverage to include certain losses that would otherwise be excluded by the standard care, custody or control exclusion found in a standard policy.
- j. Notice of Cancellation: The Contractor will provide the Contracting Authority thirty (30) days prior written notice of policy cancellation or any changes to the insurance policy.
- k. If the policy is written on a claims-made basis, coverage must be in place for a period of at least 12 months after the completion or termination of the Contract.
- Owners' or Contractors' Protective Liability: Covers the damages that the Contractor becomes legally obligated to pay arising out of the operations of a subcontractor.
- m. Non-Owned Automobile Liability Coverage for suits against the Contractor resulting from the use of hired or non-owned vehicles.
- n. Advertising Injury: While not limited to, the endorsement must include coverage piracy or misappropriation of ideas, or infringement of copyright, trademark, title or slogan.



- o. All Risks Tenants Legal Liability to protect the Contractor for liabilities arising out of its occupancy of leased premises.
- Sudden and Accidental Pollution Liability (minimum 120 hours): To protect the Contractor for liabilities arising from damages caused by accidental pollution incidents.
- q. Litigation Rights: Pursuant to subsection 5(d) of the <u>Department of Justice Act</u>, S.C. 1993, c. J-2, s.1, if a suit is instituted for or against Canada which the Insurer would, but for this clause, have the right to pursue or defend on behalf of Canada as an Additional Named Insured under the insurance policy, the Insurer must promptly contact the Attorney General of Canada to agree on the legal strategies by sending a letter, by registered mail or by courier, with an acknowledgement of receipt.

A copy of the letter must be sent to the Contracting Authority. Canada reserves the right to co-defend any action brought against Canada. All expenses incurred by Canada to co-defend such actions will be at Canada's expense. If Canada decides to co-defend any action brought against it, and Canada does not agree to a proposed settlement agreed to by the Contractor's insurer and the plaintiff(s) that would result in the settlement or dismissal of the action against Canada, then Canada will be responsible to the Contractor's insurer for any difference between the proposed settlement amount and the amount finally awarded or paid to the plaintiffs (inclusive of costs and interest) on behalf of Canada.

## 12. Liability

The Contractor is liable for any damage caused by the Contractor, its employees, subcontractors, or agents to Canada or any third party. Canada is liable for any damage caused by Canada, its employees or agents to the Contractor or any third party. The Parties agree that no limitation of liability or indemnity provision applies to the Contract unless it is specifically incorporated in full text in the Articles of Agreement. Damage includes any injury to persons (including injury resulting in death) or loss of or damage to property (including real property) caused as a result of or during the performance of the Contract.

#### 13. Ownership Control

Where the Contractor will have access to any and all personal and confidential information belonging to Canada, CSC staff or inmates for the performance of the work, the following will apply:

- 13.1 The Contractor warrants that it is not under ownership control of any non-resident entity (i.e. Individual, partnership, joint venture, corporation, limited liability company, parent company, affiliate or other).
- 13.2 The Contractor must advise the Minister of any change in ownership control for the duration of the contract.
- 13.3 The Contractor acknowledges that the Minister has relied on this warranty in entering into this Contract and that, in the event of breach of such warranty, or in the event that the Contractor's ownership control becomes under a non-resident entity, the Minister will have the right to treat this Contract as being in default and terminate the contract accordingly.
- 13.4 For the purposes of this clause, a non-resident entity is any individual, partnership, joint venture, corporation, limited liability company, parent company, affiliate or other residing outside of Canada.

#### 14. Closure of Government Facilities

- 14.1 Contractor personnel are employees of the Contractor and are paid by the Contractor on the basis of services rendered. Where the Contractor or the Contractor's employees are providing services on government premises pursuant to this Contract and the said premises become non accessible due to evacuation or closure of government facilities, and consequently no Work is being performed as a result of the closure, Canada will not be liable for payment to the Contractor for the period of closure.
- 14.2 Contractors working at CSC sites should be aware that they may be faced with delay or refusal of entry to certain areas at certain times even if prior arrangements for access may have been made. Contractors are advised to call in advance of travel to ensure that planned access is still available.


## 15. Tuberculosis Testing

- 15.1 It is a condition of this contract that the Contractor or any employees of the Contractor who require entry into a Correctional Service of Canada Institution to fulfill the conditions of the contract may, at the sole discretion of the Warden, be required to provide proof of and results of a recent tuberculin test for the purpose of determining their TB infection status.
- 15.2 Failure to provide proof of and results of a tuberculin test may result in the termination of the contract.
- 15.3 All costs related to such testing will be at the sole expense of the Contractor.

## 16. Compliance with CSC Policies

- 16.1 The Contractor agrees that its officers, servants, agents and subcontractors will comply with all regulations and policies in force at the site where the work covered by this contract is to be performed.
- 16.2 Unless otherwise provided in the contract, the Contractor must obtain all permits and hold all certificates and licenses required for the performance of the Work.
- 16.3 Details on existing CSC policies can be found on the <u>CSC website</u> or any other CSC web page designated for such purpose.

## 17. Health and Labour Conditions



- 17.1 In this section, "Public Entity" means the municipal, provincial or federal government body authorized to enforce any laws concerning health and labour applicable to the performance of the Work or any part thereof.
- 17.2 The Contractor must comply with all laws concerning health and labour conditions applicable to the performance of the Work or part thereof and must also require compliance of same by all its subcontractors when applicable.
- 17.3 The Contractor upon any request for information or inspection dealing with the Work by an authorized representative of a Public Entity must forthwith notify the Project Authority or Her Majesty.
- 17.4 Evidence of compliance with laws applicable to the performance of the Work or part thereof by either the Contractor or its subcontractor must be furnished by the Contractor to the Project Authority or Her Majesty at such time as the Project Authority or Her Majesty may reasonably request."

#### 18. Identification Protocol Responsibilities

The Contractor must ensure that the Contractor and each of its agents, representatives or subcontractors (referred to as Contractor Representatives for the purposes of this clause) comply with the following self-identification requirements:


- 18.1 During the performance of any Work at a Government of Canada site, the Contractor and each Contractor Representative must be clearly identified as such at all times;
- 18.2 During attendance at any meeting, the Contractor or Contractor Representatives must identify themselves as such to all meeting participants;
- 18.3 If the Contractor or a Contractor Representative requires the use of the Government of Canada's e-mail system in the performance of the Work, then the individual must clearly identify themself as the Contractor or an agent or subcontractor of the Contractor in all electronic mail in the signature block as well as under the e-mail account Properties. This identification protocol must also be used in all other correspondence, communication, and documentation; and
- 18.4 If Canada determines that the Contractor is not complying with any of the obligations stated in this article, Canada will advise the Contractor and request that the Contractor implement, without delay, appropriate corrective measures to eliminate recurrence of the problem.

## 19. Dispute Resolution Services

The Parties agree to make every reasonable effort, in good faith, to settle amicably all disputes or claims relating to the Contract, through negotiations between the Parties' representatives authorized to settle. If the Parties do not reach a settlement within 25 working days after the dispute was initially raised to the other party in writing, either Party may contact the Office of the Procurement Ombudsman (OPO) to request dispute resolution/mediation services. #### 20. Contract Administration

The Contractor must keep private and confidential any such personal information collected, created or handled by the Contractor under the Contract, and must not use, copy, disclose, dispose of or destroy such personal information except in accordance with this clause and the delivery provisions of the Contract.
- 21.2 All such personal information is the property of Canada, and the Contractor must have no right in or to that information. The Contractor must deliver to Canada all such personal information in whatever form, including all copies, drafts, working papers, notes, memoranda, reports, data in machine-readable format or otherwise, and documentation which have been made or obtained in relation to this Contract, upon the completion or termination of the Contract, or at such earlier time as the Minister may request. Upon delivery of the personal information to Canada, the Contractor must have no right to retain that information in any form and must ensure that no record of the personal information remains in the Contractor's possession.

#### 22. Proactive Disclosure of Contracts with Former Public Servants

By providing information on its status, with respect to being a former public servant in receipt of a <u>Public Service Superannuation Act</u> (PSSA) pension, the Contractor has agreed that this information will be reported on departmental websites as part of the published proactive disclosure reports, in accordance with <u>Contracting Policy Notice: 2019-01</u> of the Treasury Board Secretariat of Canada.

#### ANNEX A - Statement of Work

The Correctional Service Canada has a requirement to provide pest control services.

## Mandatory site visit:

You are required to attend a mandatory site visit for Pest Control Services at Stony Mountain Institution if you wish to bid on this service contract. Your quotation will be deemed non-responsive if you have not attended the site visit.

The site visit is scheduled for November 9th, 2022 at 10:00 hours (local time).

You must confirm your attendance to Daniel Wyspianski (<u>Daniel.Wyspianski@csc-scc.gc.ca</u>) by 16:00 hours (local time), November 7, 2022.

Any cell phones, cameras or cigarettes are not allowed in the institution therefore must be left in your vehicles.

## 1. Background:

Stony Mountain Institution is a multi security level Federal Government Men's Prison located in a rural area approximately 11 kilometers north of Winnipeg, on Highway #7, adjacent to the town of Stony Mountain, Manitoba. There are approximately 650 to 750 offenders housed in our Medium – Maximum Security facility and 160 to 250 offenders housed at our Minimum facility.

#### 2. Objective:

Stony Mountain Institution requires pest control services over a 5-year fiscal period (April 1, 2023 to March 31 2028).

## 3. Tasks:

The contractor must provide recommendations, materials, labour, equipment; including the necessary supervision to eradicate, fumigate or remove pests of all types from the Institutional site. This includes, but is not limited to: **insects** - such as bees (honey bee swarms must be captured), wasps, hornets, bedbugs, flies, etc.; **rodents** – such as mice, rats, Townsend's Ground Squirrels (gophers), skunks etc. and **birds** – such as pigeons.

Special care along with recommendations to prevent the unintentional poisoning or harm to any protected species of insects, wildlife or CSC owned animals must be taken.

The inspections are to be completed on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of each month.

Security of the Institution and individuals is always the priority in the performance of any contract and related tasks.

## Monthly inspection:

Estimated level of effort: 4 hours per month

- The contractor is to perform mandatory monthly inspections of the following areas: Visits (V&C), Private Family Visits (PFV's), Health Services, Food Services and the Stores Warehouse
- 2. All other areas of the site will be inspected on a rotating basis or as required, being determined by the Project Authority or their designate.

- 3. The contractor must continuously benchmark all service functions, recommending alternative innovative products and technologies for continuous pest control improvement.
- 4. The areas of pest control include all buildings, perimeter walls, fence lines, site grounds, and the underground Institutional tunnel system.
- The Institution owns all bait stations, monitoring stations, fly lights and other pest control devises. New or replacement products will be purchased as necessary from and supplied by the contractor. Newly purchased devises will be supplied baited and ready to use.
- 6. Each control devise in the designated inspection area listed in point one (1) above, will be inspected, cleaned, rewound and / or rebaited during each monthly inspection.. Pest control stations located in other areas will be checked and baited on a rotational basis or as required by the Project Authority or their designate
- 7. The contractor must dispose of all trapped or captured rodents and used supplies in an appropriate manner.
- 8. Attached to each device will be a service data sticker which indicates the bait contained and the date of last service.
- For the control of larger animals, such as skunks they are required to be live trapped or captured, then removed from the site for proper disposal. Under no circumstances shall these animals be euthanized or disposed of on site.
- 10. The application of pesticides or fumigations must be approved by the Project Authority prior to the applications.
- 11. All chemicals, baits and pesticides used or consumed, must comply with relevant government regulations and authorities. These products are to be the least toxic to the environment and persons.
- 12. All bait and pesticide formulations used must be monitored to avoid pest tolerance.
- 13. Prior to use of any chemical or bait, the SDS (formally MSDS) information must be provided to the Project Authority or Designate in PDF format and paper copy.
- 14. Contractor's representative/technician must have numbered work orders detailing the areas of inspection, problems encountered and work performed. The work orders must be signed by the Project Authority or designate indicating the work has been completed; a copy is to remain with the Project Authority or designate.

## **Burrow Baiting:**


Estimated level of effort:

Is determined by the area being baited, estimated minimum 2 to 8 hours per baiting and follow up visit.

Estimated amount of materials required:

Is determined by the area being baited, i.e. the number of burrows baited.

- 1. Townsend's Ground Squirrel (gopher) control is performed as required and determined by the Project Authority or designate.
- 2. The areas of control are:
  - a. Security yard fence line
  - b. The field and pond area directly in front of the Institution, approximately 5 acres
  - c. The field area between the Institution and the town, approximately 15 acres.



- d. Around offender houses and other out buildings
- 3. Protected species and migratory birds must not be affected by any control program.
- 4. Animals such as badgers, foxes, muskrats and woodchucks must be live trapped and released in a non urban area.
- 5. Underground cabling and sensors must be taken into consideration when determining the type of eradication method used.
- 6. Bait and placement is to be determined by the service technician's best experience.
- 7. A follow up inspection is immediately required to remove any surface dead animals.

## **Bedbugs**

- If bedbugs are discovered during a monthly inspection, the area will be immediately sealed to prevent further spread. The inspecting technician and the Project Authority or their designate will take immediate steps to trace any further infection of the Institution, closing any additional areas.
- 2. Prior to carrying out of a bed bug eradication program, a written report must be provided within 48 hours. This report is to detail the extent of the infection, location (s), the recommended methods of extermination and the total cost of the process.
- 3. The extermination process is to begin within 24 hours after receiving Institutional approval.

## **Minor Installation or Mounting Charges**

- 1. The Institution may require the Contractor to provide additional service for the installation or minor repair of pest control devices such as mounting fly lights.
- 2. Correctional Service Canada agrees to pay a minimum 1 hour charge should the mounting take less than 1 hour.
- 3. Major renovation to the facility (such as installation or repairs of electrical outlets or bird spike installation) is not considered as minor installation.

## **Major Pest Control Projects**

- 1. Major or out of norm pest control projects, such as the supply and installation of bird netting or bird spikes or under site tunnel baiting, is considered as major work and outside of the monthly inspection.
- 2. The contractor will be asked for their recommendations.
- Service time lines and costs would be determined at the time of need.

The contractor's representative providing pest control services must maintain all necessary licencing and certifications required by the province of Manitoba.

The Contractor must provide personnel who have confined space training as required. The Project Authority may ask at any point for proof of certification.

The Contractor must respond to emergency calls within 2 hours.

Hours of Work – The hours of work/schedule will be agreed upon by the Contractor and Project Authority and done such that there will be a minimum of impact to the normal institutional routine.

All work and requests from the Contractor will be addressed to the Project Authority and or his delegate.

#### 4. Deliverables

Contractor's representative/technician must have numbered work orders signed by the Project Authority or designate indicating that the work has been completed and a copy is to be left with the Project Authority.

Prior to use of any chemical or bait, the SDS (formally MSDS) information must be provided to the Project Authority or Designate in PDF format and paper copy.

## 5. Location of work:

- a. The Contractor must perform the work at Stony Mountain Institution, 11 kilometers north on Highway #7 North at Stony Mountain, Manitoba
- Travel
   No travel is anticipated for performance of the work under this contract.

## 6. Language of Work:

The contractor must perform all work in English. All reports/documentation must be presented in English.

## 7. Security:

All contractor personnel are required to sign in at the Construction Escort Office located at the south end of building C-17 (Stores) on arriving at site for work, and sign-out, when leaving.

All contractor personnel will be escorted at all times by the project authority or their designate in the performance of their pest control duties.

The Contractor must comply with all regulations, instructions and directions in force on the site where the work is performed.

The Contractor, its officers, servants, agents and sub-contractors are responsible to immediately report to CSC security personnel and any information about or observations of inmate conduct that could jeopardize anyone's safety or the security of the institution.

It is recommended that contractors have no additional dealings with inmate outside the scope of work, unless absolutely necessary, this is for the protections of both parties concerned. The only exception will be inmates who are lawfully employed by the contractor and this expectation only extends to work related matters

#### 8. Constraints:

A written list of all tools and equipment must be provide to the Officer In Charge at the Principal Entrance any time the Contractor enters the Institution.

The Contractor shall note the environment in which CSC conducts its operations to meet its mandate. Situations may change, depending on legislative or policy changes or incidents related to correctional operations. The Project Authority or their designate may request that the Contractor modify the deliverables or schedules in response to these changes.

#### 1.0 Technical Evaluation:

- 1.1 The following elements of the proposal will be evaluated and scored in accordance with the following evaluation criteria.
  - Mandatory Technical Criteria (M!-M2)

It is <u>imperative</u> that the proposal <u>address each of these criteria</u> to demonstrate that the requirements are met.

- 1.2 LISTING EXPERIENCE WITHOUT PROVIDING ANY SUBSTANTIATING DATA TO SUPPORT WHERE, WHEN AND HOW SUCH EXPERIENCE WAS OBTAINED WILL RESULT IN THE STATED EXPERIENCE NOT BEING CONSIDERED FOR EVALUATION PURPOSES.
- 1.3 All experience must be strictly work-related. Time spent during education and/or training will not be considered, unless otherwise indicated.
- 1.4 Experience must be demonstrated through a history of past projects, either completed or on-going.
- 1.5 References must be provided for each project/employment experience.
- I. Where the stated experience was acquired within a Canadian Federal Government Department or Agency as a Public Servant, the reference must be a Public Servant who had a supervisory role over the proposed resource during the stated employment.
- II. Where the stated experience was acquired within a Canadian Federal Government Department or Agency as a consultant, the reference must be the Public Servant who was identified as the Project Authority of the project on which the proposed resource acquired the experience.
- III. References must be presented in this format:

## 1.6 Response Format

- I. In order to facilitate evaluation of proposals, it is recommended that bidders' proposals address the mandatory criteria in the order in which they appear in the Evaluation Criteria and using the numbering outlined.
- II. Bidders are also advised that the month(s) of experience listed for a project or experience whose timeframe overlaps that of another referenced project or experience will only be counted once. For example: Project 1 timeframe is July 2001 to December 2001; Project 2 timeframe is October 2001 to January 2002; the total months of experience for these two project references is seven (7) months.
- III. For any requirements that specify a particular time period (e.g., 2 years) of work experience, CSC will disregard any information about experience if the technical bid does not include the required month and year for the start date and end date of the experience claimed.
