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#### **PART 1 - GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### 1. Introduction

The Request for Standing Offer (RFSO) is divided into seven parts plus attachments and annexes, as follows:

- Part 1 General Information: provides a general description of the requirement;
- Part 2 Offeror Instructions: provides the instructions applicable to the clauses and conditions of the RFSO;
- Part 3 Offer Preparation Instructions: provides Offerors with instructions on how to prepare their offer to address the evaluation criteria specified;
- Part 4 Evaluation Procedures and Basis of Selection: indicates how the evaluation will be conducted, the evaluation criteria which must be addressed in the offer, and the basis of selection;
- Part 5 Certifications and Additional Information: includes the certifications and additional information to be provided;
- Part 6 Security, Financial and Insurance Requirements: includes specific requirements that must be addressed by Offerors; and
- Part 7 7A, Standing Offer, and 7B, Resulting Contract Clauses:

7A, includes the Standing Offer containing the offer from the Offeror and the applicable clauses and conditions:

7B, includes the clauses and conditions, which will apply to any contract resulting from a call-up made pursuant to the Standing Offer.

The Annexes include the Statement of Work, the Basis of Payment and any other annexes.

# 2. Summary

Correctional Service Canada has a requirement to provide prevention interventions such as educational learning opportunities and support services in order to reduce the transmission of infectious diseases to federal inmates in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2) in an as and when requested basis.

- This requirement is divided into 2 Streams. Bidders may submit a bid for one (1) Stream or for the two (2) Streams. Bidders must refer to Annex B Basis of Payment for the estimated level of effort for each Stream.
- CSC may award up to two (2) Standing Offers as part of this request for proposal process: One (1) Standing Offer for New-Brunswick and one (1) Standing Offer for Nova-Scotia.
- The Offeror may submit a bid for one or more streams of service, according to their ability to provide the required resources.
- Examples for clarity:
  - If 3 bidders submit bids for Stream 1, the lowest compliant bid will be awarded Stream 1.
  - If 5 bidders submit bids for Stream 2, the lowest compliant bid will be awarded Stream 2.

The first objective is to provide federal inmates in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2) client-centered education and support services on the topics of harm reduction associated with blood

borne sexually transmitted infections (BBSTI), addiction and substance use in order to prevent the negative consequences of substance use and improve health **on an as and when requested basis**.

The second objective is to provide prevention interventions such as educational learning opportunities and support services to clients in order to reduce the transmission of infectious diseases such as HIV and Hepatitis as well as blood borne and sexually transmitted diseases and to help clients when required in the management of infectious diseases on an as and when requested basis. The services will be delivered in collaboration with the Health Care Teams directly to inmates through non-judgmental and non-coercive strategies in order to enhance the clients' skills and knowledge to live safer and healthier lives.

The program delivery and curriculum development, for each institution, shall consist of the following:

- a. Visit and provide supportive and promotional materials for the annual AIDS Walk in federal institutions in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2). The Offeror will provide two staff and/or volunteers to attend and assist with AIDS Walk Day activities with inmates.
- b. Deliver a one-half-day Hepatitis and HIV/AIDS related workshop and provide awareness resources such as posters/brochures. Contents of workshops will provide an overview of Hepatitis and HIV in New Brunswick (Stream 1), Nova Scotia (Stream 2), Canada, and the world. These workshops may be for the purposes of delivery of the Peer Education and Counseling Training program modules as well as ongoing education of Peer Education Counselors and volunteers. The Peer Education and Counseling course is a program developed by CSC which will be available to the contractor for program delivery. One-half-day workshop constitutes of 3 hours.
- c. Deliver two separate one-half-day workshops on the Prevention of Blood borne and Sexually Transmitted Infectious Diseases to inmates. Contents of workshops will provide an overview of the low and high-risk factors for contraction of these infectious diseases, how to prevent transmission of infection, and testing information. One-half-day workshop consists of 3 hours.
- d. Provide two separate one-half-day workshops on harm reduction initiatives and safe drug usage including the impact of addiction and problematic substance use in order to reduce blood borne illnesses such as HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C and other BBSTIs to decrease the rates of deaths due to drug overdoses and reduce Stigma. One-half-day workshop consists of 3 hours.
- e. Provide two separate one-on-one individual support meetings to the HIV/Hepatitis positive inmates at each of the institutions. Duration of these sessions will be three hours and will accommodate up to three inmates per session. Every attempt shall be made to utilize these support sessions; however, if there are no HIV/Hepatitis positive offenders who request support, these sessions may be used for educational/awareness purposes.
- f. Provide four separate group support meetings to clients with addictions, including self-management strategies at each of the institutions. Duration of these sessions will be three hours and will accommodate up to ten clients per session. Every attempt shall be made to utilize these support sessions; however, if there are no offenders who request support, these sessions may be used for educational/awareness purposes.
- g. At the request of the Project Authority, participate in activities and committees related to quality improvement, patient safety, and accreditation within the institution(s), Regional Headquarters.
- h. Provide resource materials for each session that are innovative and interactive to educate and engage all participants with various learning abilities and styles in collaboration with the Project Authority to ensure that all material is appropriate to the correctional environment and meets security requirements.

- i. With each invoice, provide a written report of each session detailing the following:
  - 1. Date of each session/workshop delivery
  - 2. The number of participants
  - 3. A summary of activities and subjects covered.

With the final invoice, the following additional information must be included:

- 4. Feedback including positives and areas of improvements.
- 5. Recommendations for future program deliveries
- 6. A final report summarizing the entire project.

## 3. Security Requirements

There are security requirements associated with the requirement of the Standing Offer. #### 4. Revision of Departmental Name

As this request for Standing Offer is issued by Correctional Service of Canada (CSC), any reference to Public Works and Government Services Canada (PWGSC) or its Minister contained in full text or by reference in any term, condition or clause of this document, or any resulting contract, must be interpreted as a reference to CSC or its Minister.

## 5. Debriefings

Offerors may request a debriefing on the results of the request for Standing Offer process. Offerors should make the request to the Standing Offer Authority within 15 working days of receipt of the results of the request for Standing Offer process. The debriefing may be in writing, by telephone or in person.

#### **PART 2 - OFFEROR INSTRUCTIONS**

#### 1. Standard Instructions, Clauses and Conditions

All instructions, clauses and conditions identified in the Request for Standing Offer (RFSO) by number, date and title are set out in the <u>Standard Acquisition Clauses and Conditions Manual</u> issued by Public Works and Government Services Canada.

Offerors who submit an offer agree to be bound by the instructions, clauses and conditions of the RFSO and accept the clauses and conditions of the Standing Offer and resulting contract(s).

The <u>2006</u> (2023-06-08) Standard Instructions - Request for Standing Offer - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, are incorporated by reference into and form part of the RFSO.

Subsection 5.4 of 2006, Standard Instructions - Request for Standing Offer - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, is amended as follows:

#### 2. Submission of Offers

Offerors must submit their offer only to Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) by the date, time and at the bid submission email address indicated on page 1 of the request for standing offers (RFSO).

For offers submitted by email, Canada will delete offers delivered after the stipulated RFSO closing date and time. Canada will keep records documenting receipt of late offers by email.

Canada will not accept any delayed offers.

a. Unless specified otherwise in the RFSO, Offerors must submit their offer to the CSC bid submission email address indicated on page 1 of the RFSO document. This email address is the only acceptable email address for Offerors to submit their offer in response to this RFSO.

- b. Offerors may transmit their offer at any time prior to the RFSO closing date and time.
- c. Offerors should include the RFSO number in the subject field of their email.
- d. Canada will not be responsible for any failure attributable to the transmission or receipt of the offer by email including, but not limited to, the following:
  - i. Receipt of a garbled, corrupted or incomplete offer;
  - ii. Availability or condition of the email service;
  - iii. Incompatibility between the sending and receiving equipment;
  - iv. Delay in transmission or receipt of the offer;
  - v. Failure of the Offeror to properly identify the offer;
  - vi. Illegibility of the offer;
  - vii. Security of offer data;
  - viii. Failure of the Offeror to send the offer to the correct email address;
  - ix. Connectivity issues; or
  - x. Email attachments that are blocked or not received even though the Offeror's email has been successfully delivered.
- e. CSC will send an acknowledgement of receipt of the Offeror's email by email from the bid submission email address provided for the submission of offers. This acknowledgement will confirm only the receipt of the Offeror's email and will not confirm if all of the Offeror's email attachments have been received, may be opened nor if their contents are readable. CSC will not respond to follow-up emails from Offerors requesting confirmation of attachments.
- f. Offerors must ensure they are using the correct email address for offer submission and should not rely on the accuracy of copying and pasting the email address from the RFSO cover page.
- g. A offer transmitted by an Offeror to the CSC bid submission email address constitutes the Offeror's formal offer, and must be submitted in accordance with section 05 of 2006, Standard Instructions -Request for Standing Offers Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements.
- h. Offerors are to note that CSC's email system has a limit of 10 MB per single email message. CSC's email system will reject emails with the following attachments: batch files, executable files, and image files in the following formats: JPEG, GIF, TIFF. Canada will not accept encrypted emails or emails that include attachments with passwords.

Section 09 Customs clearance of 2006, Standard Instructions - Request for Standing Offers - Goods or Services - Competitive Requirements, is deleted in its entirety.

CSC recommends that offerors submit their response to the requirements of this request for standing offer in typewritten format.

Offerors must ensure that any handwritten information included in their offer is clearly legible in order to allow CSC to complete the offer evaluation. CSC reserves the right, at its sole and entire discretion, to disregard any handwritten information which it determines to be illegible when assessing whether offers comply with all of the requirements of the request for standing offer including, if applicable, any and all evaluation criteria.

#### 3. Former Public Servant

Contracts awarded to former public servants (FPS) in receipt of a pension or of a lump sum payment must bear the closest public scrutiny and reflect fairness in the spending of public funds. In order to comply with Treasury Board policies and directives on contracts awarded to FPSs, bidders must provide the information required below before contract award. If the answer to the questions and, as applicable the information required have not been received by the time the evaluation of bids is

completed, Canada will inform the Bidder of a time frame within which to provide the information. Failure to comply with Canada's request and meet the requirement within the prescribed time frame will render the bid non-responsive.

#### **Definitions**

For the purposes of this clause, "former public servant" is any former member of a department as defined in the *Financial Administration Act*, R.S., 1985, c. F-11, a former member of the Canadian Armed Forces or a former member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. A former public servant may be:

- a. an individual;
- b. an individual who has incorporated;
- c. a partnership made of former public servants; or
- d. a sole proprietorship or entity where the affected individual has a controlling or major interest in the entity.

"lump sum payment period" means the period measured in weeks of salary, for which payment has been made to facilitate the transition to retirement or to other employment as a result of the implementation of various programs to reduce the size of the Public Service. The lump sum payment period does not include the period of severance pay, which is measured in a like manner.

"pension" means a pension or annual allowance paid under the <u>Public Service Superannuation Act</u> (PSSA), R.S., 1985, c. P-36, and any increases paid pursuant to the <u>Supplementary Retirement</u> <u>Benefits Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. S-24 as it affects the PSSA. It does not include pensions payable pursuant to the <u>Canadian Forces Superannuation Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. C-17, the <u>Defence Services Pension Continuation Act</u>, 1970, c. D-3, the <u>Royal Canadian Mounted Police Pension Continuation Act</u>, 1970, c. R-10, and the <u>Royal Canadian Mounted Police Superannuation Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. R-11, the <u>Members of Parliament Retiring Allowances Act</u>, R.S. 1985, c. M-5, and that portion of pension payable to the <u>Canada Pension Plan Act</u>, R.S., 1985, c. C-8.

# 4. Enquiries - Request for Standing Offer

All enquiries must be submitted in writing to the Standing Offer Authority no later than five (5) business days before the Request for Standing Offer (RFSO) closing date. Enquiries received after that time may not be answered.

Offerors should reference as accurately as possible the numbered item of the RFSO to which the enquiry relates. Care should be taken by Offerors to explain each question in sufficient detail in order to enable Canada to provide an accurate answer. Technical enquiries that are of a proprietary nature must be clearly marked "proprietary" at each relevant item. Items identified as "proprietary" will be treated as such except where Canada determines that the enquiry is not of a proprietary nature. Canada may edit the question(s) or may request that Offerors do so, so that the proprietary nature of the question(s) is eliminated, and the enquiry can be answered to all Offerors. Enquiries not submitted in a form that can be distributed to all Offerors may not be answered by Canada.

#### 5. Applicable Laws

The Standing Offer and any contract resulting from the Standing Offer must be interpreted and governed, and the relations between the parties determined, by the laws in force in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Offerors may, at their discretion, substitute the applicable laws of a Canadian province or territory of their choice without affecting the validity of their offer, by deleting the name of the Canadian province or territory specified and inserting the name of the Canadian province or territory of their choice. If no change is made, it acknowledges that the applicable laws specified are acceptable to the Offerors.

## 6. Bid Challenge and Recourse Mechanisms

- (a) Several mechanisms are available to potential offerors to challenge aspects of the procurement process up to and including contract award.
- (b) Canada encourages offerors to first bring their concerns to the attention of the Contracting Authority. Canada's <u>Buy and Sell</u> website, under the heading "<u>Bid Challenge and Recourse Mechanisms</u>" contains information on potential complaint bodies such as:
  - Office of the Procurement Ombudsman (OPO)
  - Canadian International Trade Tribunal (CITT)

(c) Offerors should note that there are **strict deadlines** for filing complaints, and the time periods vary depending on the complaint body in question. Offerors should therefore act quickly when they want to challenge any aspect of the procurement process.

## 1. Offer Preparation Instructions

CSC requests that offerors provide their offer in separate sections as follows:

Section II: Financial Offer: one (1) electronic copy in PDF format

Section III: Certifications: one (1) electronic copy in PDF format

Prices should appear in the financial offer only. No prices should be indicated in any other section of the offer.

#### Offerors should submit their technical offer and financial offer in two (2) separate documents.

In order to assist Canada in meeting the objectives of the <u>Policy on Green Procurement</u>, when feasible Offerors should:

- 1) Include all environmental certification(s) relevant to your organization (such as ISO 14001, Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED), Carbon Disclosure Project, etc.).
- Include all third-party environmental certification(s) or Environmental Product Declaration(s) (EPD) specific to your product/service (such as Canadian Standards Association (CSA Group), Underwriters Laboratories (ULSolutions); Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), ENERGYSTAR, etc.).

#### Section I: Technical Offer

In their technical offer, Offerors should explain and demonstrate how they propose to meet the requirements and how they will carry out the Work.

#### Section II: Financial Offer

Offerors must submit their financial offer in accordance with Annex B, Basis of Payment. The total amount of Applicable Taxes must be shown separately.

#### Section III: Certifications

Offerors must submit the certifications and additional information required under Part 5.

1.2 The Company Security Officer (CSO) must ensure through the <u>Contract Security Program (CSP)</u> that the Offeror and proposed individual(s) hold a valid security clearance at the required level, as indicated in Part 6 – Security, Financial and Other Requirements.

## PART 4 - EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND BASIS OF SELECTION

#### 1. Evaluation Procedures

- (a) Offers will be assessed in accordance with the entire requirement of the Request for Standing Offers including the technical and financial evaluation criteria.
- (b) An evaluation team composed of representatives of CSC will evaluate the offers.

## 1.1. Technical Evaluation

#### 1.1.1 Mandatory Technical Criteria

Offers will be evaluated to determine if they meet all mandatory technical criteria outlined in **Annex D – Evaluation Criteria**. Offers not meeting all mandatory criteria will be declared non-responsive and will be given no further consideration.

#### 1.2 Financial Evaluation

SACC Manual Clause A0220T (2014-06-26), Evaluation of Price - Bid

Offers containing a financial offer other than the one requested at **Article 3. Section II: Financial Offer** of **PART 3 – OFFER PREPARATION INSTRUCTIONS** will be declared non-compliant.

#### 2. Basis of Selection

- 2.1 SACC Manual Clause M0031T (2007-05-25) Basis of Selection Mandatory Technical Criteria Only
- **2.2** An offer must comply with the requirements of the Request for Standing Offers and meet all mandatory technical evaluation criteria to be declared responsive. The responsive offer with the lowest evaluated price will be recommended for issuance of a standing offer.

## **PART 5 - CERTIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

Offerors must provide the required certifications and additional information to be issued a Standing Offer.

The certifications provided by Offerors to Canada are subject to verification by Canada at all times. Unless specified otherwise, Canada will declare an offer non-responsive, will have the right to set-aside a standing offer, or will declare a contractor in default, if any certification made by the Offeror is found to be untrue whether made knowingly or unknowingly during the offer evaluation period, during the Standing Offer period, or during the contract period.

The Standing Offer Authority will have the right to ask for additional information to verify the Offeror's certifications. Failure to comply and to cooperate with any request or requirement imposed by the Standing Offer Authority will render the offer non-responsive, result in the setting aside of the Standing Offer or constitute a default under the Contract.

## 1. Certifications Precedent to the Issuance of a Standing Offer and Additional Information

The certifications and additional information listed below should be submitted with the offer, but may be submitted afterwards. If any of these required certifications or additional information is not completed and submitted as requested, the Standing Offer Authority will inform the Offeror of a time frame within which to provide the information. Failure to provide the certifications or the additional information listed below within the time frame provided will render the offer non-responsive.

#### 1.1 Integrity Provisions – Declaration of Convicted Offenses

- Subject to subsection B, by submitting an offer in response to this request for standing offer (RFSO), the Offeror certifies that:
- i. it has read and understands the Ineligibility and Suspension Policy;
- ii. it understands that certain domestic and foreign criminal charges and convictions, and other circumstances, as described in the Policy, will or may result in a determination of ineligibility or suspension under the Policy;
- iii. it is aware that Canada may request additional information, certifications, and validations from the Offeror or a third party for purposes of making a determination of ineligibility or suspension;

6.2 The original and (1) copy must be forwarded to the address shown on page 1 of the Call-up for certification and payment.

## 7. Insurance – Specific Requirements

The Contractor must comply with the insurance requirements specified below. The Contractor must maintain the required insurance coverage for the duration of the Contract. Compliance with the insurance requirements does not release the Contractor from or reduce its liability under the Contract.

The Contractor is responsible for deciding if additional insurance coverage is necessary to fulfill its obligation under the Contract and to ensure compliance with any applicable law. Any additional insurance coverage is at the Contractor's expense, and for its own benefit and protection.

The Contractor must forward to the Contracting Authority within ten (10) days after the date of award of the Contract, a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the insurance coverage and confirming that the insurance policy complying with the requirements is in force. Coverage must be placed with an Insurer licensed to carry out business in Canada. The Contractor must, if requested by the Contracting Authority, forward to Canada a certified true copy of all applicable insurance policies.

- 7.1. The Contractor must obtain Commercial General Liability Insurance and maintain it in force throughout the duration of the Contract, in an amount usual for a contract of this nature, but for not less than \$2,000,000 per accident or occurrence and in the annual aggregate.
- 7.2 The Commercial General Liability policy must include the following:
  - a) Additional Insured: Canada is added as an additional insured, but only with respect to liability arising out of the Contractor's performance of the Contract. The interest of Canada should read as follows: Canada, as represented by the Correctional Service of Canada.
  - Bodily Injury and Property Damage to third parties arising out of the operations of the Contractor.
  - c) Products and Completed Operations: Coverage for bodily injury or property damage arising out of goods or products manufactured, sold, handled, or distributed by the Contractor and/or arising out of operations that have been completed by the Contractor.
  - d) Personal Injury: While not limited to, the coverage must include Violation of Privacy, Libel and Slander, False Arrest, Detention or Imprisonment and Defamation of Character.
  - e) Cross Liability/Separation of Insureds: Without increasing the limit of liability, the policy must protect all insured parties to the full extent of coverage provided. Further, the policy must apply to each Insured in the same manner and to the same extent as if a separate policy had been issued to each.
  - f) Blanket Contractual Liability: The policy must, on a blanket basis or by specific reference to the Contract, extend to assumed liabilities with respect to contractual provisions.
  - g) Employees and, if applicable, Volunteers must be included as Additional Insured.
  - h) Employers' Liability (or confirmation that all employees are covered by Worker's compensation (WSIB) or similar program)
  - Broad Form Property Damage including Completed Operations: Expands the Property Damage coverage to include certain losses that would otherwise be excluded by the standard care, custody or control exclusion found in a standard policy.

- j) Notice of Cancellation: The Contractor will provide the Contracting Authority thirty (30) days prior written notice of policy cancellation or any changes to the insurance policy.
- k) If the policy is written on a claims-made basis, coverage must be in place for a period of at least 12 months after the completion or termination of the Contract.
- I) Owners' or Contractors' Protective Liability: Covers the damages that the Contractor becomes legally obligated to pay arising out of the operations of a subcontractor.

## 7.3 Litigation Rights:

7.3.2 A copy of the letter must be sent to the Contracting Authority. Canada reserves the right to co-defend any action brought against Canada. All expenses incurred by Canada to co-defend such actions will be at Canada's expense. If Canada decides to co-defend any action brought against it, and Canada does not agree to a proposed settlement agreed to by the Contractor's insurer and the plaintiff(s) that would result in the settlement or dismissal of the action against Canada, then Canada will be responsible to the Contractor's insurer for any difference between the proposed settlement amount and the amount finally awarded or paid to the plaintiffs (inclusive of costs and interest) on behalf of Canada.

## 8. Liability

The Contractor is liable for any damage caused by the Contractor, its employees, subcontractors, or agents to Canada or any third party. Canada is liable for any damage caused by Canada, its employees or agents to the Contractor or any third party. The Parties agree that no limitation of liability or indemnity provision applies to the Contract unless it is specifically incorporated in full text in the Articles of Agreement. Damage includes any injury to persons (including injury resulting in death) or loss of or damage to property (including real property) caused as a result of or during the performance of the Contract.

# 9. Ownership Control

Where the Contractor will have access to any and all personal and confidential information belonging to Canada, CSC staff or inmates for the performance of the work, the following will apply:

- 9.1 The Contractor warrants that it is not under ownership control of any non-resident entity (i.e. Individual, partnership, joint venture, corporation, limited liability company, parent company, affiliate or other).
- 9.2 The Contractor must advise the Minister of any change in ownership control for the duration of the contract.
- 9.3 The Contractor acknowledges that the Minister has relied on this warranty in entering into this Contract and that, in the event of breach of such warranty, or in the event that the Contractor's ownership control becomes under a non-resident entity, the Minister must have the right to treat this Contract as being in default and terminate the contract accordingly.
- 9.4 For the purposes of this clause, a non-resident entity is any individual, partnership, joint venture, corporation, limited liability company, parent company, affiliate or other residing outside of Canada.

#### 10. Closure of Government Facilities

- 10.1 Contractor personnel are employees of the Contractor and are paid by the Contractor on the basis of services rendered. Where the Contractor or the Contractor's employees are providing services on government premises pursuant to this Contract and the said premises become non accessible due to evacuation or closure of government facilities, and consequently no Work is being performed as a result of the closure, Canada will not be liable for payment to the Contractor for the period of closure.
- 10.2 Contractors working at CSC sites should be aware that they may be faced with delay or refusal of entry to certain areas at certain times even if prior arrangements for access may have been made. Contractors are advised to call in advance of travel to ensure that planned access is still available.

#### 11. Tuberculosis Testing

- 11.1 It is a condition of this contract that the Contractor or any employees of the Contractor who require entry into a Correctional Service of Canada Institution to fulfill the conditions of the contract may, at the sole discretion of the Warden, be required to provide proof of and results of a recent tuberculin test for the purpose of determining their TB infection status.
- 11.2 Failure to provide proof of and results of a tuberculin test may result in the termination of the contract.
- 11.3 All costs related to such testing will be at the sole expense of the Contractor.

#### 12. Compliance with CSC Policies

- 12.1 The Contractor agrees that its officers, servants, agents and subcontractors will comply with all regulations and policies in force at the site where the work covered by this contract is to be performed.
- 12.2 Unless otherwise provided in the contract, the Contractor must obtain all permits and hold all certificates and licenses required for the performance of the Work.
- 12.3 Details on existing CSC policies can be found on the <u>CSC website</u> or any other CSC web page designated for such purpose.

#### 13. Health and Labour Conditions

- 13.1 In this section, "Public Entity" means the municipal, provincial or federal government body authorized to enforce any laws concerning health and labour applicable to the performance of the Work or any part thereof.
- 13.2 The Contractor must comply with all laws concerning health and labour conditions applicable to the performance of the Work or part thereof and must also require compliance of same by all its subcontractors when applicable.
- 13.3 The Contractor upon any request for information or inspection dealing with the Work by an authorized representative of a Public Entity must forthwith notify the Project Authority or His Majesty.
- 13.4 Evidence of compliance with laws applicable to the performance of the Work or part thereof by either the Contractor or its subcontractor must be furnished by the Contractor to the Project Authority or His Majesty at such time as the Project Authority or His Majesty may reasonably request."

## 14. Identification Protocol Responsibilities

The Contractor must ensure that the Contractor and each of its agents, representatives or subcontractors (referred to as Contractor Representatives for the purposes of this clause) comply with the following self-identification requirements:

- 14.1 During the performance of any Work at a Government of Canada site, the Contractor and each Contractor Representative must be clearly identified as such at all times;
- 14.2 During attendance at any meeting, the Contractor or Contractor Representatives must identify themselves as such to all meeting participants;
- 14.3 If the Contractor or a Contractor Representative requires the use of the Government of Canada's email system in the performance of the Work, then the individual must clearly identify themself as the Contractor or an agent or subcontractor of the Contractor in all electronic mail in the signature block as well as under the e-mail account Properties. This identification protocol must also be used in all other correspondence, communication, and documentation; and
- 14.4 If Canada determines that the Contractor is not complying with any of the obligations stated in this article, Canada will advise the Contractor and request that the Contractor implement, without delay, appropriate corrective measures to eliminate recurrence of the problem.

## 15. Dispute Resolution Services

The Parties agree to make every reasonable effort, in good faith, to settle amicably all disputes or claims relating to the Contract, through negotiations between the Parties' representatives authorized to settle. If the Parties do not reach a settlement within 25 working days after the dispute was initially raised to the other party in writing, either Party may contact the Office of the Procurement Ombudsman (OPO) to request dispute resolution/mediation services. #### **ANNEX A - STATEMENT OF WORK**

Correctional Service Canada has a requirement to provide prevention interventions such as educational learning opportunities and support services in order to reduce the transmission of infectious diseases to federal inmates in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2) in an as and when requested basis. The work will involve the following:

## 1.1 Background:

The Correctional Service Canada (CSC) is the federal government agency responsible for administering sentences of a term of two years and more, as imposed by the Courts. CSC is responsible for managing institutions of various security levels and supervising offenders under conditional release in the community.

CSC operates under three levels of management: National, Regional, and Institutional/District Parole Offices. The National Headquarters in Ottawa performs overall planning and policy development for the Service, while each of the five Regional Headquarters implement CSC activities within their respective Regions.

CSC's Health Services Sector enables CSC to attain its mission and mandate by providing clients with efficient and effective health services that encourage client's responsibility, by promoting healthy reintegration and contributing to safe communities.

CSC's Health Services views time in custody as an important opportunity to intervene and improve the health of our population. Consistent with its transformation agenda, CSC recognizes that health outcomes are a shared responsibility between service providers and inmates. Inmates must be involved in taking responsibility and proactive measures to safeguard their health, which includes the importance of adopting harm reduction practices, healthy living education, addiction awareness and support, education on the prevention of infectious diseases in order to improve the client's health while in custody as there are potential benefits for all Canadians.

CSC Health Services has recently adopted a patient Centered Care Model, putting the patient at the center, intervening to empower the patient by improving their confidence and increasing their health related knowledge to persuade them to reduce risk taking behaviors and adopt healthy lifestyles.

Correctional Service Canada is mandated to support clients in preventing and managing chronic health conditions. Health promotion interventions such as providing education, awareness and support on topics such as; harm reduction practices, drug addictions and transmission of infectious diseases are key activities in preventing and managing health conditions.

Many people who experience addiction or substance use issues also experience stigma and discrimination. There is still much to learn about the complexities of substance use and addiction.

It is also CSC's policy to provide clients access to outside service organizations in the eventuality of continuity of care and community support after release. Community connections and involvement in meaningful activities can contribute to individuals becoming less likely to have substance use or addiction related issues.

## 1.2 Objectives:

The first objective is to provide federal inmates in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2) client-centered education and support services on the topics of harm reduction associated with blood borne sexually transmitted infections (BBSTI), addiction and substance use in order to prevent the negative consequences of substance use and improve health **on an as and when requested basis**.

The second objective is to provide prevention interventions such as educational learning opportunities and support services to clients in order to reduce the transmission of infectious diseases such as HIV and Hepatitis as well as blood borne and sexually transmitted diseases and to help clients when required in the management of infectious diseases <u>on an as and when requested basis</u>. The services will be delivered in collaboration with the Health Care Teams directly to inmates through non-judgmental and non-coercive strategies in order to enhance the clients' skills and knowledge to live safer and healthier lives.

#### 1.3 Tasks:

When services are required, the Project Authority will make the determination to issue a call-up. The Offeror on an "as and when requested" basis will carry out the details in the call up as described below:

- a. Provide evidence-based infectious disease education and prevention services to the general inmate population, and individual support/management to Hepatitis and HIV positive inmates residing at the above-mentioned institutions.
- b. Provide evidence-based education and prevention services to the general inmate population and individual support/management to reduce blood borne illnesses and sexually transmitted Infections in the context of substance use and other high-risk health behaviors to inmates residing at the above-mentioned institutions.
- c. Coordinate the dates of the activities listed below with the respective Health Care Teams of the above-mentioned institutions with at least 30 days' advance notice and provide information to the Project Authority of any items that will be required or brought into the institution to ensure that security requirements are met.

#### 1.4 Deliverables:

The program delivery and curriculum development, for each institution, shall consist of the following:

- a. Visit and provide supportive and promotional materials for the annual AIDS Walk in federal institutions in New Brunswick (Stream 1) and in Nova Scotia (Stream 2). The Offeror will provide two staff and/or volunteers to attend and assist with AIDS Walk Day activities with inmates.
- b. Deliver a one-half-day Hepatitis and HIV/AIDS related workshop and provide awareness resources such as posters/brochures. Contents of workshops will provide an overview of Hepatitis and HIV in New Brunswick (Stream 1), Nova Scotia (Stream 2), Canada, and the world. These workshops may be for the purposes of delivery of the Peer Education and Counseling Training program modules as well as ongoing education of Peer Education Counselors and volunteers. The Peer Education and Counseling course is a program developed by CSC which will be available to the contractor for program delivery. One-half-day workshop constitutes of 3 hours.
- c. Deliver two separate one-half-day workshops on the Prevention of Blood borne and Sexually Transmitted Infectious Diseases to inmates. Contents of workshops will provide an overview of the low and high-risk factors for contraction of these infectious diseases, how to prevent transmission of infection, and testing information. One-half-day workshop consists of 3 hours.
- d. Provide two separate one-half-day workshops on harm reduction initiatives and safe drug usage including the impact of addiction and problematic substance use in order to reduce blood borne illnesses such as HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C and other BBSTIs to decrease the rates of deaths due to drug overdoses and reduce Stigma. One-half-day workshop consists of 3 hours.
- e. Provide two separate one-on-one individual support meetings to the HIV/Hepatitis positive inmates at each of the institutions. Duration of these sessions will be three hours and will accommodate up to three inmates per session. Every attempt shall be made to utilize these

support sessions; however, if there are no HIV/Hepatitis positive offenders who request support, these sessions may be used for educational/awareness purposes.

- f. Provide four separate group support meetings to clients with addictions, including self-management strategies at each of the institutions. Duration of these sessions will be three hours and will accommodate up to ten clients per session. Every attempt shall be made to utilize these support sessions; however, if there are no offenders who request support, these sessions may be used for educational/awareness purposes.
- g. At the request of the Project Authority, participate in activities and committees related to quality improvement, patient safety, and accreditation within the institution(s), Regional Headquarters.
- h. Provide resource materials for each session that are innovative and interactive to educate and engage all participants with various learning abilities and styles in collaboration with the Project Authority to ensure that all material is appropriate to the correctional environment and meets security requirements.
- i. With each invoice, provide a written report of each session detailing the following:
  - 1. Date of each session/workshop delivery
  - 2. The number of participants
  - 3. A summary of activities and subjects covered

- 4. Feedback including positives and areas of improvements
- 5. Recommendations for future program deliveries
- 6. A final report summarizing the entire project

## 1.6 Language of Work:



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
